MARTIN B. KUNES
Word has been received of the death of Martin R. Kunes, 88, a native of Blanchard, Centre county, who died Saturday afternoon at the home of his daughter, Mrs. James Carney, Erie, Pa. Kunes lived for several years in Williamsport and also at Jersey Shore. He was one of the original Pennsylvania canal boatmen, and also engaged in the lumber business years ago, at which time he was associated with John E. DuBois of DuBois. Mr. Confer had not been in good health since four years ago when he suffered a light stroke. Up until that time he had been employed at the Federal Match Company plant. Mr. Confer was a son of John and Sarah Grimm Confer and was born in Bellefonte on August 25, 1882, making his age at time of death 56 years, 2 months and 10 days. He was united in marriage with Sarah Flack who survives with the following children: George, John, Samuel, James, Clarence, Albert, Earl, and Harry; and Miss Pearl, all of Bellefonte; and Mrs. James Ginter, of Bellefonte, R. J. L. TRESSEL ANSWERS CHARGE OF BAR ASSOCIATION
Referring to the action taken last week by the County and State Bar Associations to restrain him from the practice of law, J. L. Tressel, who with his wife, M. E. The statement adds that it was not his intention to engage in the practice of law and that he would have gladly quit had the local bar ruled that the work he was doing was illegal. He says the literature was sent out nearly four months ago, and that he cannot understand why action against him was not taken at that time.
