

Lemont Man Meets Death on Highway

(Continued from page one) by the impact. He was dead when the driver of the car ran to his assistance. Death was attributed to a fractured skull, which was badly splintered about the right side.

At the inquest conducted Friday morning by Dr. W. R. Heaton, of Philadelphia, Centre County Coroner, at the E. E. Widows Funeral Home, Bellefonte, Mr. Mong was completely exonerated of any responsibility in the fatality.

Mr. Mong testified that Mr. Hall staggered in front of his car, and that even though the machine was swung to the left to avert an accident, the pedestrian veered in its path. Three other witnesses testified that Hall was intoxicated at the time, and that a short time before he had appeared at the home of Elmer Kauffman, on the highway north of the scene of the accident, and that upon leaving the home he was seen to be staggering on the center of the road. They declared they saw Mong swing wide in an attempt to miss the man and that the car was moving at a moderate speed.

Mr. Hall, a native of Hubersburg, made his home with his son-in-law, Reuben White, at Lemont. He was employed and is survived by three daughters: Mrs. Wierite, Audrey Hall, of Hubersburg, and Mary Hall, of Williamsport. His wife passed away nine years ago. Other survivors include two sisters residing in the Pittsburgh area, and two grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday morning from the Widows Funeral Home, Bellefonte, in charge of the Rev. Mr. Kline, of Hubersburg. Interment was made in the Curtin cemetery.

AN ORDINANCE

PROVIDING FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND REGULATION OF SEWERS AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL PLANT IN THE BOROUGH OF BELLEFONTE, COUNTY OF CENTRE, AND STATE OF PENNSYLVANIA, THE ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF RENTALS FOR THE USE OF THE SEWERS THEREIN, AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Borough Council of the Borough of Bellefonte, County of Centre and State of Pennsylvania, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same. SECTION 1. The President and Secretary of the Borough Council are hereby directed, authorized and empowered to, forthwith, enter into a contract with the Bellefonte Borough Authority, a corporation organized and existing pursuant to the Act of June 28, 1935, P. L. 463, as amended by the Act of May 20, 1937, P. L. 729, wherein and whereby the said Borough of Bellefonte shall lease, for a period of thirty (30) years, the sewage disposal plant, with its appurtenances, now proposed to be erected by said Authority pursuant to Grant No. Pa. 2116-F of the United States of America through the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works.

SECTION 2. That the following rates and charges are hereby levied and assessed against the property owners using the sewers of the Borough of Bellefonte, or whose such sewers are available for the use of such property owners, as follows, to wit: DWELLING AND APARTMENTS From 1 to 10 rooms (not including bath or storage) \$0.20 each per year. Each additional room \$0.10 each per year.

SECTION 3. The aforesaid rates shall be due and payable at the office of the Water Superintendent of the Borough of Bellefonte on the first days of January, April, July and October of each year. If such rentals are not paid on or before the first day of the quarter next following their due date, a penalty of ten per cent thereof shall be added thereto.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall become effective on January 1, 1939. SECTION 5. Nothing herein contained shall be construed as repealing, altering, changing or otherwise affecting all other ordinances of the Borough of Bellefonte pertaining to sewers or to connections therewith.

Art Windows Dedicated at Gap Church

(Continued from page one) and Mrs. E. K. Keller, and Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Dale. Many of the honored persons are living and were present at the dedication.

The 70th anniversary program resulted in a kind of home-coming, for many former members of the church, many of them living at considerable distances, gathered at Pleasant Gap during the weekend. The program was instigated and directed by Mrs. Margaret Schreffler, and the interior of the church was beautifully decorated with flowers for the occasion. Exceptionally large attendances marked all services, with the peak attendance being present for the anniversary address given by the Rev. John F. Harkins of State College. The Rev. L. J. Kauffman, pastor of the church, was in charge of the service.

St. Mark's church owes its beginning to the efforts of the Rev. Mr. Heckenburg, who while pastor of the Bellefonte Lutheran church in 1868, organized a branch congregation at Pleasant Gap. The constitution of the new church was adopted March 1, 1868. The church remained part of the Bellefonte charge until 1875, when with the opening of a Lutheran church at Boalsburg, the Pleasant Gap parish became a part of the Boalsburg charge.

The original building was erected in 1870, and this edifice was in use until 1916 when a new brick building, erected on the same site in the northern part of the town, was dedicated.

First officers of the Pleasant Gap congregation were: W. J. Dale, elder; B. S. Miller and C. Dale, Jr., deacons; A. J. Swartz and William Dale, trustees. There were 45 members in the congregation, and the same bell that called worshippers to services 70 years ago is still in service today.

Some mystery surrounds the origin of the church bell, for the present church records, some of which are no longer legible because of age, do not mention where the bell was procured, and old residents of the town have no recollection of its origin.

At the present time St. Mark's congregation numbers 115 members, with the following officers: R. F. Zimmerman, elder; J. B. Swartz and Frank Keller, deacons; G. G. Dale, treasurer; Boyd Krape, trustee, and Margaret Schreffler, secretary.

Since its establishment the church has had fifteen pastors, who have served an average of slightly less than five years each. The pastors are: The Reverends Mr. Heckenburg, Tomlinson, Miller, Furst, Jacob Yutzey, George Divin, M. O.

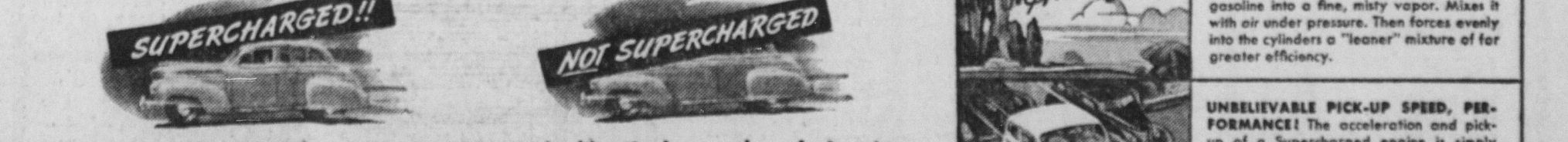
