with it the stipulation that both young men will report to Swengel H. Smith, Centre County parole officer, once a month for two years. They must give an account of where they have been and what they have been doing. In addition, a cost of about \$30 must be paid by the parents of the defendants.

Judge Rhoads stated that something must be done about the stealing of bicycles in his community where the practice has come to be very annoying. Parents purchasing new bicycles for their children, when stolen repeatedly, he said. The judge spoke of his own son's bicycle being stolen a year ago and of his knowledge that after bicycles were stolen they were taken apart and some "manufactured" from parts of different bicycles, which characterized the offense as "tormenting."

Chief of Police John G. Good, in presenting the case to the court, remarked that bicycle stealing has come to be a major offense in that community where 183 have been stolen this year.
