Sarah Ann's Cooking Class

This time of the year every hotisekeeper is busy planning her cakes for the Christmas feast. Fruit cake is much improved by time-standing allows the many fruits and 375 degrees for 1 hour. spices to blend together to make a delightful cake.

There are two kinds of Iruit cake, a dark one, which is heavily spiced, made with brown sugar or molasses. which adds to the spicy flavor; the white fruit cake is made without spices. The cakes may be baked or steamed according to preference. Bake your pound cake a day or so before you wish to use it.

Black Fruit Cake No. 1

- dozen eggs
- pound sugar pound butter
- pounds flour pounds shelled nuts, chopped
- cup brandy
- teaspoons cinnamon
- teaspoon allspice
- pounds raisins pounds currants
- pound citron, cut fine pound dates, chopped
- cup molasses
- teaspoon cloves teaspoons nutmeg 1 teaspoon soda

The flour should be slightly browned in the oven before commencing the cake. Cream the sugar and butter, add eggs, the yolks and the whites being beaten separately and one pound of flour. Use the other flour to dredge the fruit when added to the cake batter. Lastly add soda, dissolved in 1 tablespoon of water, add brandy. Divide into 2 parts and bake at temperature 275 degrees for 2 hours.
