SAMUEL GRAY KEPHART.

Samuel Gray Kephart, well known retired farmer residing at Fillmore, died at his home on Wednesday Nov. 23rd, at 2:30 a. m. of pneumonia, following an illness of ten days. He was the son of C. H. and Amanda Gray Kephart. His age at time of death was 83 years. He is survived by two sisters, Miss Laura at home and Mrs. James P. Parsons of Toledo, Ohio. Funeral services were held at the late home on Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with Rev. Wallace Cummings officiating. Burial was made in Grays cemetery. He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church since childhood.

LEE P. STRICKLER.

Lee P. Strickler, a life-long resident of Blanchard, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Fred Miller and family, in that place, on Monday evening at 8:20 o'clock of a heart ailment. A retired lumberman, Mr. Strickler was 78 years of age. He was born at Beaverstown November 8, 1862, the son of Philip and Mary Strickler. His wife, Carrie A. Kunes, preceded him in death some years ago. Survivors are three daughters: Mrs. Fred Miller, Mrs. John Helchel, of Blanchard, and Mrs. William Durkin, of Monument. His only son, Frank, of St. Marys, died August 7, 1938. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. Jane Shambaugh, of Lykens, Pa., and three brothers: Henry Strickler, of Armstrong; Ross Strickler, of Endoott, N. Y.; and Maine Strickler, of Niagara Falls. The funeral will be held in the church at Blanchard this Thursday afternoon at 2 p. m. Services will be in charge of Rev. A. G. Herr, of Bellefonte, and interment will be made in the Baptist cemetery.

Mrs. Sarah Ellen Resides, widow of the late William S. Resides, died at her home on East High street Wednesday night of last week, following several months illness of a heart ailment. Mrs. Resides has been active up until about ten weeks ago when she sustained a fall on North Allegheny street, resulting in shock which her declining age was unable to withstand. The death of Major Curtin came as a shock to his legion of friends in Bellefonte and throughout the county. While his condition was known to be serious, there were indications during the weeks following his removal to the hospital when encouraging reports came from his bedside. It was thought at one period of his illness that he had a chance for recovery, but he was unable to rally from the ravaging attack of pleurisy he suffered in September. He passed away at the age of 56 years.

Irvena Youth in Philipsburg Hospital Recovering From Shattered Hip

His hip shattered by a rifle bullet, James Wright, a 15-year-old Irvena youth is a patient in the Philipsburg State Hospital, victim of the accidental discharge of a rifle in the hands of his brother. The shooting, at first surrounded by mystery, was later solved by state police from the Clearfield area. The shooting, which happened Tuesday morning of last week in the backyard of the Wright home at Irvena, was cleared up when the boy's older brother, Floyd, 17, who had been in hiding because of fear of the police, confessed shooting his younger brother.
