Pennsylvania Has National Potato Week

Distribution Being Stimulated Through Consumer Packages

CHOICE PRODUCT OF

Potato Regarded as One of

Most Healthful Vegetables Grown

(Special to the Centre Democrat) Pennsylvania is observing Nation- to Walla Walla penitentiary. al Potato Week-December 2-10-by distributing through the usual channels 187,500 consumer packages of Pennsylvania grown "Blue Label" potatoes to consumers in this State. National Potato Week was organized for the purpose of attracting consumer attention to the fact that public health has suffered, according to medical science, through the decline in recent years in the per capita consumption of potatoes in the United States.

Americans who are trying to keep their youthful figures should cut out several other types of foods before they do the potato; foods such as sugar, fats and oil which are considerably more fattening and which carry none of the potato's minerals and vitamins.
