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'ABDUCTORS' PLEAD GUILTY

4 SENTENCED FOR TAKING HOWARD GIRL TO MARYLAND

Defendants in Two Paternity Cases, Found Guilty; May Seek New Trials

COLLEGE MAN GETS \$300 FINE, 3 MONTHS IN JAIL

Howard Man Freed by Jury on Charge of Drunken Driving

The regular December criminal court closed Tuesday afternoon when a docket of nine cases was cleared in two days through five jury trials and four pleas of guilty.

Two of the defendants against whom juries returned verdicts of guilty are to seek new trials, it is understood. Both are paternity cases. In three other jury trials, the defendants were found not guilty, but in two instances were directed to pay the costs. In the remaining acquittal verdict the costs were placed on the county.

In an unexpected move, four Howard men charged with the "abduction" of a 14-year-old Gravel Point school girl, last October, waived a trial by jury and entered pleas of guilty to formal charges of "enticing a female child."

Earl Mann, 24, of near Howard, who with three other men from that area was charged with taking the girl to Carroll county, Md., reportedly so Mann could marry her, was sentenced to serve three months in the county jail and to pay the costs of prosecution. His three companions were placed on probation.

Fire Damages House At Gap

T. E. Jodon Family Suffer From Smoke and Gas in Early Morning Blaze

Damage estimated at approximately \$1,000 resulted from a fire of undetermined origin in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas E. Jodon, at Pleasant Gap, early Saturday morning.

Members of the household, in their bedrooms at the time the blaze was discovered about 6:45 a. m., suffered considerably from the effects of smoke and from gas escaping from an electric refrigerator, as they fought their way down the stairway to leave the burning home.

Brother of Centre County Man Drowns

Word was received last week from Portland, Me., that Earl E. Love, a former Lock Haven resident, and brother of LeRoy B. Love, of Mt. Eagle. No details of the fatality were given except that it occurred at the Portland water front and that the body up to that time had not been recovered.

Mr. Love and his wife left Lock Haven about two and a half years ago to take up residence in Portland. He is survived by his wife, two children, his parents and several brothers and sisters.

Collapse of State Authority Plan Ruins \$2,230,295.90 County Program

A \$2,230,295.90 building program in Centre County calling for the erection of a number of schools and a riding hall for Troop L, Bellefonte, has been abandoned through the failure to finance the State Authority's ambitious \$150,000,000 supplementary construction program to provide 704 new schools and 135 institutional additions in Pennsylvania.

Maj. R. Douglas Andrews, regional PWA director is quoted as saying: "I don't see how it would be humanly possible for many of these \$39 projects to go through now. The State Authority has never shown us that it has the ability to finance its 55 per cent share of the cost. Practically all of our money has been allocated. There is very, very little left for this pending program."

PWA regulations provided that ground was to be broken on all of the projects by December 31.

Col. A. S. Janaway, executive director of the Authority, said flatly the program is "dead."

In Centre County, the death of the program sounds taps for the following buildings:

Machine Gun Troop, Bellefonte, riding hall; total cost \$65,000. An 11-room addition and double gymnasium for the Bellefonte High School; total cost \$244,778.42. New High School building at State College, total cost, \$693,060.

Rector Nears 35th Year In Priesthood

Rev. Father Wm. E. Downes to Observe Anniversary Next Wednesday

HAS SERVED LOCAL PARISH SINCE 1917

Is Member of Diocesan Matrimonial Court; Holds Other Church Offices

Wednesday, December 21, will mark another important milestone in the career of the Rev. Father William E. Downes, rector of St. John's Catholic church, Bellefonte, for on that day he will observe the 35th anniversary of his entrance into the priesthood.

The well known local pastor, who on July 1 of this year reached his 21st year of service in the Bellefonte Parish, has attained outstanding prominence in the Altoona Diocese of the church.

He is one of the few irremovable pastors in the Diocese; is secretary of the Diocesan School Board, is one of the judges of the Diocesan Matrimonial Court and is otherwise active in the work of the church in the district.

Heart Attack Fatal to Prominent Wingate Merchant; Funeral Monday

Stricken by a heart attack at his home shortly after he had driven the Boggs township school bus to Central City, Lewis E. Davidson, prominent resident of Wingate, died almost instantly about 9:40 o'clock Friday morning. Loses Part of Finger In Mishap Near Home

Jacob Smith, well known carpenter, was painfully injured Sunday morning in a fall at his home in Bush Addition, near Bellefonte.

Mr. Smith had gone into the shop near home to get some drill bits to loan to friends employed in opening a grave in the New Union cemetery, near Unionville, and was returning to the home carrying the sharp bits in his left hand when he stumbled and fell.

In striking the ground, his fingers were forced against the bits, and the middle finger of the left hand was severed. The index finger of the same hand was lacerated. The man was brought to the offices of a Bellefonte physician where the injuries were treated, and yesterday Mr. Smith was reported to be recovering nicely at his home. He is a brother of Lewis Smith, Bellefonte contractor, by whom he is employed.

Sewage Plant Bonds Are Sold

Money to be Turned Over to Borough Upon Release of Final Legal Opinion

Former Judge M. Ward Fleming, solicitor for Bellefonte Borough, yesterday was notified that the three firms which last Wednesday night tentatively purchased a \$70,000 bond issue by Bellefonte Borough for the construction of a sewage disposal plant, have sold the bonds.

The Borough Authority, in behalf of the Borough, is to receive the money as soon as an independent bonding firm has prepared a final legal opinion upon the procedure followed in setting up the Authority and preparing the bond issue. This is expected to be merely a matter of routine.

The three firms which purchased the bonds are: Burr & Co., Inc., Philadelphia; Moore, Leonard and Lynch, Pittsburgh, and Cloney & MacGregor, also of Pittsburgh. They submitted a joint bid calling for an interest rate of 4 per cent.

6 Persons Held For Sheltering Asthmatic Rockview Inmate

WILL BE RE-SENTENCED IN COURT TODAY

Officers Suspect Prisoner May Have Been Assisted in Escape

Thomas Lyceet, 32, asthmatic Rockview prisoner who amazed officials of the institution by escaping to the mountains Tuesday morning of last week, and who was recaptured at the home of his girl friend near Washington, Pa., Sunday night, is lodged in the Centre county jail awaiting appearance before Judge Ivan Walker this morning on charges of escaping from the institution.

Six persons charged with aiding and sheltering a fugitive from justice are being held for court in Washington under \$500 bond each. The six are: Isaac Whiteman, at whose home the man was found; Jesse Lyceet, the prisoner's brother; Ethel Ulkom, 28, the fugitive's girl friend, and Clarence Sedler, Delbert Tenney and Hilda Williams (Continued on page seven)

Jury Reports On Hunter's Death

Coroner's Inquest Reveals Sunbury Man Was Killed By a Party Unknown

Meeting at Woodward, Monday, to investigate the cause of Centre county's only hunting fatality of the antlerless deer season, a jury under the direction of Coroner W. R. Heaton decided that Victor Frank, 44, of Sunbury, was killed by a stray bullet fired from the gun of a party unknown. Frank was fatally wounded just as he was preparing to leave the woods in the southeast part of Haines township on the last day of the deer season.

A striking coincidence was brought out at the inquest when it was shown another Sunbury hunter, not a member of the party with which Frank was hunting, had been hunting on the other side of the crest of the hill where Frank was fatally wounded.

Clinton County Man Dies In Fire

Frank Burfield Burned to Death as Family Makes Escape

Frank H. Burfield, 65, was burned to death about 5 o'clock Tuesday morning in a fire which destroyed his home at Birch Island, near Potterdale, Keating township, in the western end of Clinton county.

Burfield, his son, aged 25, the latter's wife and two small children resided in a three-room bungalow. John awoke nearly smothered by smoke, to find the roof of the dwelling in flames.

He awakened his wife and each carried a child from the building through a window. As he left the room, the door of which was cut off by flames, John called to his father who was sleeping in another bed and reported that the elderly man answered, "Come and get me."

When he returned to the room, John said he could not find his father (Continued on Page 6)

The statement of claims set forth that Mr. Polette was fatally injured in an automobile accident December 4, 1937, on the highway between State College and Boalsburg. He died several hours after the head-on crash, in the Centre County Hospital, Bellefonte. Yesterday McMullin had no notice when his case would be called.
