It takes some time for ordinary people (of whom we have so many) to understand the "why and wherefore" of new programs and new attempts at attainment. A large number of us including many farmers and of course some who do not know a plow from a hayrack connected the National Government's Crop and Soil Conservation program.

We were not thinking about the problem of the plowing of the Western plains when we talked about these things and assisted by the fact that the plains (which were once pasture grounds for thousands of cattle) had now been under cultivation—the result of the top soil on the wheat and corn farmers in the east do not know wheat every year on the same land and as they try to keep part of their farms in grass of different kinds they are not so apt to suffer such a loss.

According to Farm and Home programs which gets their hand and authentic information there are now more than 100 soil conservation projects in force as compared to only 14 this time last year. Experience some times is a dear teacher but as our government has experts who have been educated to investigate these things some of which we know very little about, we should at least give their credit for knowing what is best in many instances. One valuable piece of advice is the right way to plow hills to conserve the soil and prevent erosion.
