Peter was a native of Bethsaida but lived in Capernaum during the time when he first comes to our attention. He had been attracted by the preaching of John the Baptist and his attention had been called to Jesus by his brother Andrew, who probably little realized the important contribution he was making to Chrisianity when he enlisted the dynamic energy of his more famous brother. By trade, Peter was a fisherman, and in this he was like most of the other apostles. We are not to understand, however, by that that his industry was inconsequential, for in that day, it is probable that fishing ranked as a large and important
