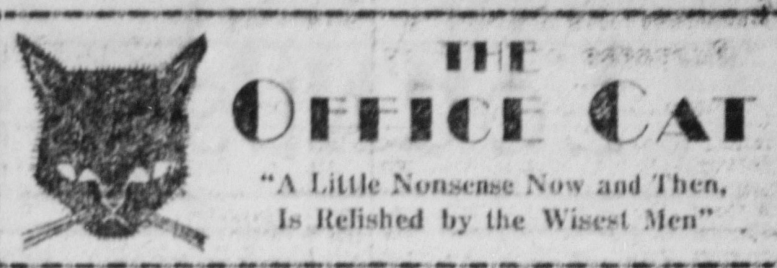

IT'S A FACT. Mrs. P. G. Gray, Superintendent, Centre County Hospital.

Approved hospital insurance carriers in this county now have membership of more than 2,775,000.

A gain of more than 1,000,000 during the first eleven months of 1935. By January 1st, it is estimated 10,000 more will have joined.

Spread of group hospitalization in Pennsylvania keeps pace with its growth in the nation.

The Hospital Service Association of Pittsburgh has an enrollment of 50,000, with 23 hospitals in attendance.

The Eastern plan when enacted in 1930 membership from nearly New Jersey as well as the Eastern Central area of Pennsylvania has changed its name with the approval of the State Insurance Department.

This State's oldest hospital care insurance plan will now be known as the Hospital Service Plan of the Lehigh Valley.

Associated Hospital Service, Inc., of Philadelphia, began enrolling members the first week of November and had a total enrollment of nearly 10,000 at the end of their first month.

Such hospital insurance plans, by which the country's great middle class can prepare and budget for illness at the rate of three cents a day, are regarded as vitally important to the future of hospitals.

MULCH PROTECTS PLANTS AGAINST DEEP FREEZING. Now that the ground is frozen, it is time to finish mulching of flowers, shrubbery, shrubs and trees.

Oak leaves, straw manure, buckwheat hulls, peat moss, salt marsh hay, or evergreen boughs may be used. Some gardeners use crushed brick, but this is not a wise practice near the house.

It is particularly important to mulch trees and shrubs that were planted late in the fall. A mulch keeps the ground from freezing deeply. This permits the roots to continue to take up moisture.

Evergreen hedges pruned with last year's growth may be damaged by heavy snow if it is permitted to collect on them. It is advisable to clear the snow away, but never when the plants are covered with ice.

County Agent R. C. Blaney also has a few suggestions for persons having flower gardens. For example, newspapers placed against the windows at night are used to protect plants from cold drafts.

It is wise against watering house plants in the afternoon since the foliage should not be wet when night comes. Scrubbing the leaves of foliage with a soap solution will free them from dust, causing the pores of green leaves to close.

It is a good idea during dull weather to discontinue fertilizing house plants.

Payments on the tax will be made to the General Fund for fuel, and the other half cent is refunded to the county in which it is collected.

In order to insure expenditure of the refund in the manner fixed by law, each county is required to submit a report showing the manner in which the last refund was expended before it is eligible to receive the next payment.

Heading today's payments is Allegheny county which received \$212,162. Montgomery county is second with \$146,706, and Delaware third with \$120,055.
