The body was brought to Bellefonte on the 8-42 train, Tuesday morning, and was taken to the E. E. STUTTERING MEN MORE COMMON, SAYS EXPERT

Stuttering men are three times as common as stuttering women, Dr. Herbert Koepf-Baker, assistant professor of speech who is in charge of the speech clinic at the Pennsylvania State College, believes. "Some persons hold to the belief that fewer women than men stutter because women change their minds rapidly and often," Professor Koepf-Baker said. "This is not true. There is some physiological basis to the fact that females do not suffer as frequent breakdowns in speech as males. The absence of stuttering in women is probably due to some subtle sex link."

NO RAIN HAS FALLEN HERE FOR 85 YEARS

Natives of the desert city of Gadenas, in North Africa, haven't seen rain in eighty-five years, according to the Century Travel Bureau at Rockefeller Center, New York. All the houses of the city are made of mud and if there were rain the houses would be washed away.

DECEMBER BROUGHT RECORD NUMBER OF DEATHS IN AREA

December 1938 brought more deaths in the Bellefonte area than any other month in the past four years, it was revealed yesterday by Miss Martha McKnight, of East Howard Street, Registrar of Vital Statistics for Bellefonte borough and Spring, Benner and Walker townships. During the last month of the old year there were 27 deaths in the area, Miss McKnight reports. Taken all in all, however, the number of deaths during the entire year was about average, the total being 197 as compared with 179 in 1937, and 196 in 1936.

Neither was there any great difference in the number of births. In 1936 a total of 387 babies were born in the area. In 1937 the total was 454, and in 1938 the total will be about 420. Birth certificates do not have to be returned until January 10, and therefore the exact number of births will not be ascertained until that date.

The reason there are so many more births than deaths in the Bellefonte area, Miss McKnight explained, is because all babies born at the Centre County Hospital are included in the figures, regardless of the place of residence of the parents.

HAMMER AND BUTCHER KNIFE USED IN FIGHT

Following a ferocious fight in which a hammer and a butcher knife were said to have been used, a Curwensville man is being held in the Clearfield county jail while authorities waited to see if Joseph Bunnell, 49, of Hyde would recover quickly from his injuries. Arrested by the state police of Clearfield was Steve Haversack, 26, of Curwensville. He claimed Bunnell had made threats against his mother. Police quoted Bunnell as saying the scrap was caused by whiskey.

Bunnell was taken to the Clearfield hospital where he was suffering from three broken ribs, lacerations of the face and right ear, contusions of the head and cuts about the hands. Hospital authorities said that fears were felt at first for Bunnell's life but that later his condition was improved.

Jump on Firetruck Fatal

Because he could not resist the impulse to jump on a fire truck and ride with the firemen, Frank Campbell, 30, of Philadelphia, is dead. Campbell, a volunteer helper at a fire, leaped on the hook and ladder truck as it started to leave the scene, slipped and fell under the rear wheels and was instantly killed.
