Everything was in readiness for construction of a new wing last fall when it was discovered that a \$55,000 debt increase approved by Bellefonte voters at a special election was invalid because of error in stating the question on the ballot. Consequently the entire program was held up, the WPA funds set aside for the building were withdrawn and the board now faces the problem of beginning anew.
