Sunday School Lesson

PETER SEES CHRIST'S GLORY

International Sunday School Lesson for January 15, 1939. GOLDEN TEXT: "We beheld his glory, glory as of the only begotten from the father."—John 1:14. Lesson Text: Matthew 17:1-18; 2 Peter 1:16-18.
