If there's anything in salary spent according to teaching done and subjects being exposed to eighth graders should be scholarly prepared in extra time for High school entrance exams this year. But that's another fable we still disapprove, the luxury of no department work and two teachers in one room where one handled the same work with a larger class of students just as efficiently other years.
