Judge Walker Rules Couple Has Been Performing **Duties of Attorneys**

> FINAL DECREE WILL ACT AS RESTRAINING ORDER

Advertising Claims of Licensee's Service Bureau Used to Support Decision

Charges by the State and the Centre County Bar Association that sel, of East Bishop Street, Bellefonte, have been engaging in the unauthorized practice of law, were upheld yesterday in an opinion filed by Judge Ivan Walker, before whom a hearing in the matter was held several weeks ago,

The defendants are given ten days in which to file exceptions to the ruling, and in case no exceptions are filed, the decree will become final and will act as a restraining order against Mr. and Mrs. Tressel.

To reach his conclusions, Judge Walker cites a previous Court ruling "... a lawyer has, through patient

license to engage in its practice he applies his knowledge in three principal domains of professional activity,

"1. He instructs and advises clients in regard to the law, so that they may . . . be informed as to their rights and obligations. "2. He prepares for clients docu-

ments requiring familiarity with legal principles beyond the ken of "3. He appears for clients before public tribunals . . . in order that he may assist the deciding official

in the proper interpretation and

enforcement of the law." Using these factors as a guide, Judge Walker's opinion states there is no evidence that either of the defendants appeared before any public tribunal representing anyone, so there is no violation of that part of a lawyer's duties.
