Political Sage Sees Many Candidates

Another Republican worker who is now sealer of weights and measures in the county, may run for Commissioner unless he gets a better job than the one he has. There's going to be quite a battle for Sheriff on the Republican slate. There's Clark N. Akey, of Hecla, who wants either a plum or a shrivelly William Benford, of Bellefonte, may be another try for the office, while Roy Held of Madisonburg, long ago indicated he'd be a candidate. Deputy Sheriff Lee Tice, they say, wouldn't mind being Sheriff for four years.

For Treasurer Harry P. Jones has already announced his candidacy on the Republican ticket. He may have to defeat Fred Bender, of State College, and Roland Williams, of Fleming, at the primaries to enter the final contest against the Democratic nominee, whoever he or she may be.

It's almost a foregone conclusion that Bond C. White will be a candidate for re-election as Prothonotary on the Republican ticket, and that Leamer R. Woodring, of Milesburg, will seek a second term as Recorder.

That brings us to the Register's office. I hear that the present incumbent, John L. Wetzel, of Central City, is toying with the idea of running for a third term on the Democratic ticket, and that if he doesn't run, his present deputy, Miss Geraldine Hilger, of Bellefonte, may be a candidate for the office on the G. O. P. slate. County Treasurer Raymond N. Brooks of Bellefonte, also has his eye on the Register's office as does Charles Musser, of Bellefonte, who was defeated by Mr. Wetzel four years ago.

They tell me G. Mac Fry, well known resident of Pennsylvania Furnace, has been smitten by the political bug and may announce himself as a candidate for Register on the Democratic slate.

Clem Gramley, of Rebersburg, will again run for County Auditor, while Auditor Dave Holter, of Howard, and a Republican stalwart, kind of feels as though a plum should fall his way. However, if one doesn't his name appear in the primary ballot, The Democratic auditor, Harry A. Corman, of Spring Mills, is sitting tight and not saying much. He shows some indication of wanting fresh pastures.

J. C. Fox, of Unionville, is making himself active, but I haven't been able to learn what office he is pointing for.

And don't forget the Coroner. Dr. W. R. Heaton, of Philipsburg, has held office for so long, and has been so everlastingly a candidate that most of you younger fellows would think a ballot in a county election wasn't official unless it had Doc Heaton's name on it. I hear they're figuring on abolishing the office of Coroner in Pennsylvania, but before they do it would be kind of nice to see how a Coroner from some other part of the county but Philipsburg would act.

The Democrats, still out of breath from last fall's election, haven't got back on their feet at this time, but just because few runners are around is no reason to think they won't come back from Salt River in fine shape. Prior to four years ago they got loked for 40 years straight and still managed to stage a comeback. Last fall was only a breather, they claim.

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sonally made a radio appeal in an effort to establish his identity and locate his family and friends.

According to word received by the Bellefonte Trust Company, executor of the McNitt estate, members of the family who participated in the interview, say the Mississippi man bears no resemblance to McNitt.

Those who talked with the stranger in Harrisburg were Dr. Steckel, brother-in-law, and A. B. McNitt and R. C. McNitt, brothers of the missing lumberman. All three are residents of the Milroy area.

The radio appeal was made Tuesday night of last week as a feature of the "We the People" program over the Columbia Broadcasting System. Many persons in the Bellefonte area heard the appeal, and while no one recognized his voice, several detected a strong similarity between the description of the speaker and the missing Bellefonte man.

McNitt was last seen in Philadelphia on April 22, 1929. In November 1936, after he had been missing for more than seven years, the local courts declared him legally dead, and his estate, valued at \$100,000 at the time of his disappearance, was settled accordingly.

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Name Jurors For Feb. Term of Court

ually a panel of 24 Grand Jurors are chosen, only 23 have been drawn for February court. The law provides that a vote of 12 jurors shall constitute a majority on a Grand Jury. With 24 jurors serving, 12 would not be a majority. In the past it has so happened that every time a Grand Jury has been summoned at least one member has failed to appear because of illness or other recognized reasons. However, when 24 are summoned the possibility remains that all will respond, which would place upon the court the duty of dismissing one juror. With no means established by law for choosing the jury to be dismissed it could happen that the juror, seemingly a minor one, could assume considerable significance. It is to prevent such a situation that the Court has ordered the abbreviated panel.

Another innovation in the February jury list is noted in the number of Traverse jurors summoned. Heretofore it has been the practice to summon 50 jurors for each of the two weeks of court. For the coming session, 55 jurors have been summoned for Criminal Court, and 45 for Civil Court. This change was made because a larger panel is often needed during Criminal Court, while the civil sessions usually moving at a slower pace, require fewer jurors.

COURT DENIES PLEA FOR CHANGE IN JOINT DEED

In an opinion and decree filed this week in the matter of Mary A. McCool vs. Mattie E. Smith, both of Potter township, Judge Ivan Walker ruled that a joint deed between the two for a tract of land in Millheim Township, and that Mrs. McCool's move to have Mrs. Smith's name stricken from the joint instrument cannot be allowed.

According to the lengthy review of the case accompanying the decree, Mrs. McCool, a 78-year-old widow, purchased a piece of ground in Millheim in 1924 for \$1,000. She lived there for a time, but finally sent for her daughter, Mrs. Smith to come for her. Mrs. McCool lived for a time at the Smith home, and during that period the title to the piece of land was transferred into both their names, allegedly with the understanding that the survivor should become sole owner of the tract.

Some time after the joint deed was executed, it is set forth, relations between mother and daughter became strained, and the mother took up her abode elsewhere, instituting suit to have joint deed set aside and to again have sole title to the piece of ground.

The Court, in denying the widow's plea, finds that the joint deed cannot be set aside because there is no proof that the agreement was entered into and the deed secured with fraudulent intent on the part of the daughter.
