MRS. JOHN BEAMER

Mrs. John Beamer died at her home at Cold Stream near Philadelphia, at 8:30 Thursday morning. She had been bedfast for nearly a year. Mrs. Beamer (Eliza McCoy) was born in Bald Eagle Valley, Feb. 27, 1859. For a half a century she made her home in the Cold Stream district. Surviving her are one son, Gurne McClaughlin, Philadelphia; and one daughter, Mrs. Mildred Rouzeau of Frenchville. One sister Mrs. Mary Neahood of Port Matilda also survives. Mr. Beamer died two years ago. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock from Weber's Funeral parlor Philadelphia.
