The season for the pruning for all types of fruit trees is approaching, according to County Agent R. C. Boney. Most people have some types of fruit around their home grounds, and as spring opens up, are interested in pruning. Demonstrations will be conducted this Friday, February 24, at which Mr. J. L. McCartney, a specialist in fruit work in the Agricultural Extension service from State College, will demonstrate the better methods of pruning apples, peaches, plums, cherries, grape vines, etc.

The first demonstration will be held in the orchard of A. Y. Williams, near Unionville, at 10:00 a. m. In the afternoon, the demonstration will be held in the orchard of Walter Heckman, near Rebersburg. The afternoon demonstration will start promptly at 2:00 p. m. These demonstrations have been arranged for the convenience of anyone desiring information on pruning.
