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## Driver Held After Fatal Motor Crash

were traveling up the mountain at the time of the crash.  
Parsons' version of the wreck was that he attempted to go around the truck, saw a car approaching from the opposite direction and cut in behind the truck, slamming on his brakes as he did so. Parsons said the brakes locked throwing the car against the rear of the truck.  
When questioned the West Decatur driver, who formerly was a railroad fireman, stated he was two or three car lengths behind the truck and estimated his skidding distance at 30 feet.  
"Were you knocked out by the force of the impact?" he was asked.  
"Yes, but I remember being taken out of a car at the hospital," Parsons replied.  
Parsons judged his speed at the time of the accident at not more than 50 miles an hour.  
Two witnesses, Thomas Ginnicks and Richard Harris, Phillipsburg, who were traveling towards Port Matilda at the time of the accident, testified that the road was dry in the vicinity of the accident and that there was no ice on the road. They also affirmed that driving conditions were good and that the highway afforded a clear vision in either direction at the site of the wreck.  
The testimony of the motor police who quizzed Parsons after the accident showed that the statements the driver gave police allegedly did not coincide with the story the coroner's jury heard. Parsons is said to have told the police he did not see the truck and that he had made no attempt to pass the truck. State police said a witness to the accident who was passing the truck in the opposite direction at the time of the accident stated Parsons had not tried to pull around the truck.  
Dean English, Woodland, R. D., driver of the truck, said he saw no effort on the part of any cars which may have been following him to the rear of him to try to pass his truck.  
State police, when questioned on the possibility of Parsons sliding on the road, there were no skid marks on the road and that the car was still in high gear when the accident was investigated.  
Mrs. Stone was thrown against the windshield of the car when it struck the right rear end of the truck. She never regained consciousness.  
The accident happened two and one-half miles north of Port Matilda near Flat Rock. Parsons trailing a truck traveling towards Phillipsburg is said to have smashed into the rear of the truck. The force of the impact threw Parsons and Mrs. Stone against the windshield of the automobile. The entire front section of the car was driven past the occupants into the inside of the car.  
Both Parsons and his companion were believed dead when they were taken from the demolished machine. They were rushed to the Phillipsburg State Hospital where an examination showed Mrs. Stone was suffering from severe head injuries while Parsons' injuries were minor.  
It was 36 hours after the accident that Mrs. Stone became Centre county's eighth highway fatality victim and the ninth for the combined counties of Centre and Clearfield.  
Dr. W. R. Heaton, Centre county coroner, conducted the inquest, Monday.  
Mrs. Stone, widow of Frank Stone, was born in West Decatur. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon with burial in Stoneville, Clearfield county.
