J. Will Mayes, 66, Dies at Hospital

He was stricken ill suddenly on Thursday, February 23, and was removed at once to the hospital where an emergency operation was performed to correct a stomach condition. For a time his recovery seemed assured, but early this week began the decline which resulted fatally.

Funeral services will be held from the late residence in Howard at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, with the Rev. J. Shibli, of State College, assisted by the Rev. C. C. Shuey, of Bellefonte, and the Rev. L. E. Kline, of Howard, assisting.

Services at the grave in the Schenck cemetery, Howard, will be in charge of the Masonic fraternity, with which Mr. Mayes had been affiliated for many years.

Mr. Mayes lived to see his wife and three children precede him in death, three of them being legitimate. A son, Ralph, died during the influenza epidemic in 1918 while he was a student at the Pennsylvania State College. Another son, Harold, died in 1934 as the result of injuries received when the truck he was driving left the road and overturned. A daughter, Mary Academy, passed away in January 1938 after a brief illness with ptomaine poisoning, and Mrs. Mayes, the wife and mother, died in April, 1937.

Shortly after the death of Mary Mayes Hoffman, Mr. Mayes adopted her young daughter, Susanne Hoffman, who is the sole survivor of the J. Will Mayes family.

John William Mayes was the oldest son of the late J. B. and Mary Brown Mayes, of Houersville and was born on the old Mayes homestead near Lemont on April 21, 1872, making his age at time of death 66 years, 10 months and 23 days. After receiving his preliminary education in the College township schools, Mr. Mayes studied several terms at the Spring Hill Academy and at the age of 19 years was apprenticed for three years in his father's marble business, then located below the Batgate farm northeast of Millbrook.

As did his brothers after him, Mr. Mayes worked on farms during the years he was in school, and was thoroughly familiar with all phases of farming. It was his father's rigid practice to have all his sons trained in farming so they could return to the soil for a living if they chose to do so in later life.

After completing his apprenticeship in his father's marble business, J. Will Mayes moved to Howard on April 2, 1895, where he established a marble business which he conducted until his retirement about two years ago. On April 7, 1897, two years after going into business, Mr. Mayes was united in marriage with Edith J. Irwin, of Jacksonville.

Will Mayes' hobby was the breeding of purebred Guernsey cattle, and until two years ago when he sold his dairy stock to Mary Kidder Stuart, State College, he maintained on his farm near Howard a herd of 70 of the finest Guerneys to be found anywhere. His hobby turned into a business which for many years proved substantial financial returns. Because of his activities in this line of work, Mr. Mayes became president of the Central Pennsylvania Guernsey Breeders Association, and was vice-president of the Pennsylvania State Guernsey Breeders Association. He was well known to cattle breeders throughout the eastern part of the United States.

His agricultural pursuits on his two farms, together with his knowledge of dairy farming led to his appointment to the executive committee of the Agricultural Extension Association of Centre county, of which he was president at one time. He served as a member of the Centre County Emergency Relief Board several years ago and was a director of the Centre County unit of the American Automobile Association.

Mr. Mayes was a director of the First National Bank of Howard and had long been identified with that institution's affairs. He was president of the original Howard Fire Company and was president of the Howard School Board some years ago when the new building was constructed. He was at one time a member of Howard Borough Council, and succeeded his father-in-law, the late William Irwin, as elder of the Presbyterian church upon Mr. Irwin's death. He was an active member of the Bellefonte Kiwanis Club and took an active part in that organization's affairs.

Fraternally Mr. Mayes was affiliated with Bellefonte Lodge No. 268 F. & A. M. and was a member of the Williamsport Consistory, A. A. S. R. 32nd degree.

Surviving are four brothers: L. Frank Mayes, marble dealer and auctioneer, of Lemont; Jared Dale and Charles F. Mayes, both of Millton, and Willis A. "Jack" Moore, of Lehighton. A fifth brother, Thomas Mayes, of Johnstown, died in May, 1932.

Also surviving are three sisters: Mrs. Robert Evey, who for the past year or more has made her home with her brother in Howard; Mrs. John Mokie, of Thomas street, Bellefonte; and Miss Maude Mayes, of Lemont.

Mr. Mayes' death is the first to occur among the five Mayes brothers who chose the marble business as their occupation. All of them attained more than average success in the trade taught them by their fathers. Four of the five brothers consistently drove Franklin automobiles, and four of them were 32nd degree Masons. The five brothers, all firmly grounded in farming through their father's foresight, comprised a family unique for its close adherence to the traits learned in the parental home.

Politically J. Will Mayes was a staunch Republican, although he never aspired to any of the larger political offices in the county. Personally he was a kindly, pleasant and interesting gentleman, ready at all times to aid those less fortunate than himself, and lending his valuable support toward any move aimed at bettering the conditions of his fellowmen. His high ideals and the christian principles which characterized his dealings made him one of the county's most respected and best loved citizens.
