The location is so remote that police could not get within three miles of the place by automobile. Curtis surrendered without protest.

it has today We look at it not only from a tra-ditional standpoint, but also from a monetary standpoint as well. If you will recall, the Commonwealth spent approximately \$65,000 to build the present army post at Bellefonte. How much of this amount would be wasted if the present plans were consummated and some other branch of the service were established in place of this Machine Gun Troop? In the light of the economy program of Governor James, this

action just does not coincide at all. Are there not other cavalry organizations who have been established more recently and who do not have the tradition associated with them, or the high efficiency of this troop, which could be converted much more satisfactorily and economically?

Brooks-Doll Post, No. 33 of the American Legion is composed of men, a majority of whom at one time or other have been honored by being on the rolls of this Machine Gun Troop. Most of us were members when it was a straight cavalry unit. We enlisted for the World War under its guidon, and there are a few who started out with us who did not come back. Both Charles Doll and Edward Brooks, for whom this post is named, were members of Troop L 1st and 101st Pennsylvania Cavalry.

We most emphatically wish to urge upon you our strongest opposition to any move which will in any way endanger the future of the Machine Gun Troop of the 103rd Cavalry as a cavalry unit.

Your most earnest consideration of this appeal will be appreciated greatly by this organization, as well as by the entire community.
