"Increased asthma on week-ends or on Monday suggests over-indulgence in foods or added breathing in of dusts or other substances from home or social sources.

"Tests are made for the following 'allergic' substances: Food, fur, feathers, dust, fungus, together with all trees, Spring, Summer and Fall, and cultivated flower pollens that might be eaten or breathed into the lungs. Scratch tests are made with these substances.

"Elimination' diets have been used for a number of years. Whenever it is suspected that some food is the cause of the asthma, the patient is placed upon one of these diets and kept on it for a period of five to seven days. If no relief is obtained, he is placed upon another test diet for the same length of time and then on another and another until he finds the diet that does not cause an attack of asthma. The most dangerous sequelae of Bronchial Asthma is Pulmonary Tuberculosis towards which it has a final tendency."
