"A careful history is taken in each case and the patient is asked about all kinds of food eaten, drugs used, and pollen or dusts inhaled. Then the time of the year when attacks occur more or less often, and the surroundings of the patient at home or work are learned.

"Thus asthma that is better in the Summer and worse in the Fall, Winter and Spring should suggest food allergy or sensitiveness, and to a less extent, fur, dust and other substances breathed in during these
