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get is necessary to make up for last year's drive, when due to industrial conditions and business as a whole, the drive fell short of its goal and forced a general curtailment of allotments to the various organizations included in the fund.

The drive is felt to have a definite place in the social life of the residents of Bellefonte and surrounding towns. It eliminates the necessity of each of the participating agencies putting on a drive for funds of its own and the townspeople contributing to each one separately. One drive will cover 12 agencies and if contributions are made with this fact in mind the fund will be oversubscribed.

Provisions on the Pledge Cards allow a subscriber to specify the organizations to benefit by his subscription if he feels that he did not care to support any certain organization.

to devise grand jury procedure and head off the Dauphin County campaign charges investigation.

5—Measures to oust three Democratic appointees from the General State Authority were advanced for final action in the House. From there, they go to the Senate.

C. of C. Favors Plan
Both Rep. Herbert B. Cohen, Democratic floor leader, and Chairman Edwin Winner (R. Montomery), of the Ways and Means Committee, said the income tax proposal was endorsed by representatives of the State Chamber of Commerce and the Emergency Council of State Associations, an industrial organization.

They quoted Clarence L. Turner, analyst of the Emergency Council as saying he favored the levy "if no substitute is available." They added that Dr. Leonard P. Fox, manager of the state chamber's research bureau, favored either a net income or sales tax.

Cohen said Turner told committee members his organization approved an income tax with exemptions "until a graduated income tax can be approved by a constitutional amendment." Such an amendment was voted down at the polls three years ago.

Gates' income tax bill would grant a \$40 credit against the amount of tax payable—in effect, a \$2,000 exemption. Winner said the Republican high command believed the exemption would be held unconstitutional. If it were thrown out after the act passed, a flat income would remain on every resident of the state.

Half of the proceeds would go for general expenses of the state, including relief, and the remainder into a fund to aid financially-distressed school districts and relieve the tax burden on real estate.

Voting, But No Citizen
George Franklin, 72, of near Canton, who has been voting regularly for 50 years, has found that he is ineligible to vote and is not an American citizen. He was born in England, it is learned, and came to this country when a year old, with his parents, both of whom died a short time later. The boy was adopted, his foster father died soon, and he was adopted a second time. Mr. Franklin, janitor of the South Valley primary school, is taking out citizenship papers, but it will take several years to complete legal naturalization.

Reports current on the streets here yesterday to the effect that the assistance offices may be moved from the third and fourth floors of Temple Court Building were denied, although it was revealed that the quarters are now leased on a month-to-month basis. It is also reported that the Department prefers to have all offices on one floor, and that such an arrangement is not possible in the Temple Court. However, no other suitable location has been suggested, it is claimed.

Yesterday announcement was made that Centre county is to be allowed a total of 27 new C. C. C. camp enrollees. The allocation calls for 25 white boys and 2 colored boys. Priority is to be given boys from families receiving any kind of public or private assistance.

Applications for admission to the C. C. C. may be made by applying at the public assistance offices in Bellefonte or Phillipsburg. A special effort is to be made to secure high type boys who will go to camp, show an interest in the work and stay during their enlistment period.

ward C. Humes became the first president of the bank and John P. Harris the first cashier.

The building now occupied as a banking house was erected by the bank in 1872 at a cost of \$25,000. About eighteen years ago the board of directors authorized a remodeling of the interior which included modern quarters consistent with efficient working conditions and public convenience.

Mr. Humes served as president of the bank until his death, March 8, 1895, when he was succeeded by Dr. George F. Harris. Upon the retirement of Dr. Harris June 29, 1896, James P. Coburn was chosen as head of the institution, who served until his death near the close of the year 1908. January 2, 1909,
