Emergency Taxes Passed By House

remark that the emergency taxes were originated by the "Little New Deal" and said the Republicans saw fit to continue the Democratic taxing policies.

They expressed the same views when the Republican majority also passed the bill to authorize floating of \$175,000,000 in tax anticipation notes, a financing plan started during the previous Earle administration.

The emergency taxes, the amounts they are expected to produce in two years; and the votes by which they passed:

10 per cent on liquor sales, \$15,000,000—187-7.

Four mill personal property, \$24,000,000—159-20.

Cigarettes, \$22,300,000—196-7.

Bank shares and trust companies, \$4,250,000—192-4.

One-cent on each gallon of gasoline, \$28,640,000—197-5.

Corporate net income, (seven percent), \$52,660,000—195-3.

Corporate loans, \$6,400,000—194-4.

Utilities, \$9,750,000—196-3.

Little Opposition

Opposition to the program was expressed by Hiram G. Andrews (D-Cambria) who said he was against it as an unsound taxing plan when the Democrats started it four years ago. Representative Herbert B. Cohen, the minority floor leader, remarked that some of the bills should be amended to profit by the "test-tube" experiences of the Earle administration.

Republican Floor Leader Robert E. Woodside observed that he had been wondering what arguments the Democrats would advance when the bills came up for a final vote.

Herbert G. Gates (R-Armstrong) who led a bloc fighting for a state income tax but dropped his plan when Governor James opposed it, voted against the personal property tax.

The senate received the tax bills and sent them immediately to committee.

The deadlock in the senate over confirmation of at least some of Governor James' appointments appeared broken.

Propose State Lottery

The house law and order committee also approved a bill to legalize a State lottery. The profits would go for general State purposes. A State lottery committee would be established.
