### MRS. CHAS. W. STODDART, JR.

Mrs. Sarah Barbara Rhoades Stoddart, wife of Charles W. Stoddart, Jr., of West Prospect avenue, State College, died at 8:15 o'clock Monday night at the Centre County Hospital here, of uremic poisoning. Mrs. Stoddart became seriously ill after the birth of a daughter, Monday of last week. The child did not live. The deceased, a daughter of W. Albert and Alice Shilling Rhoades, was born in Bellefonte on July 7, 1912, making her age 26 years, 9 months and 17 days at time of death. On May 11, 1935, she was united in marriage with Charles W. Stoddart, Jr., a teacher in the State College High school, who survives with one son, Richard S., aged 3 years. Also surviving are her parents residing on East Lamb street, Bellefonte, and two sisters, Claye E. and Betty M., both at home. Mrs. Stoddart was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church at State College. A graduate of the Bellefonte High school, class of 1930, she attended the State Teachers' college at Lock Haven, completing her studies there in 1932. During the following three years she taught in the Axemans school. Funeral services will be held at 2:30 o'clock this Thursday afternoon from the State College Methodist Episcopal church, in charge of the Rev. Harry E. Babcock. Interment will be made in the Pine Hill cemetery.

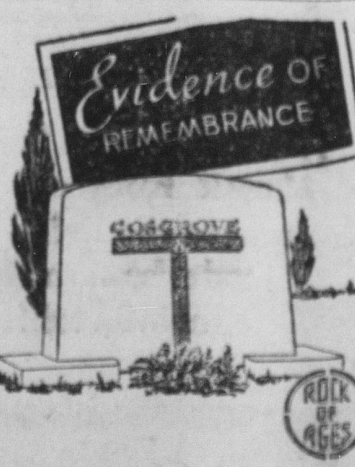
