Seek to Clarify School Question

Citizens Ask State Department to Act at Once on Building Site Matter

In a letter this week to Lester K. Ade, secretary of the Department of Public Instruction, a Bellefonte citizens' committee, headed by Mrs. George B. Thompson as chairman, asks that if the Department must act in the matter of a site for a new high school building here, such action be taken as soon as possible. The request was made apparently to clear the issue stated in a resolution passed by the school board on April 10, in which the board goes on record as favoring the present site if that site is approved by the Department of Public Instruction, and if the cost of construction on that site is not materially greater than on a new site.

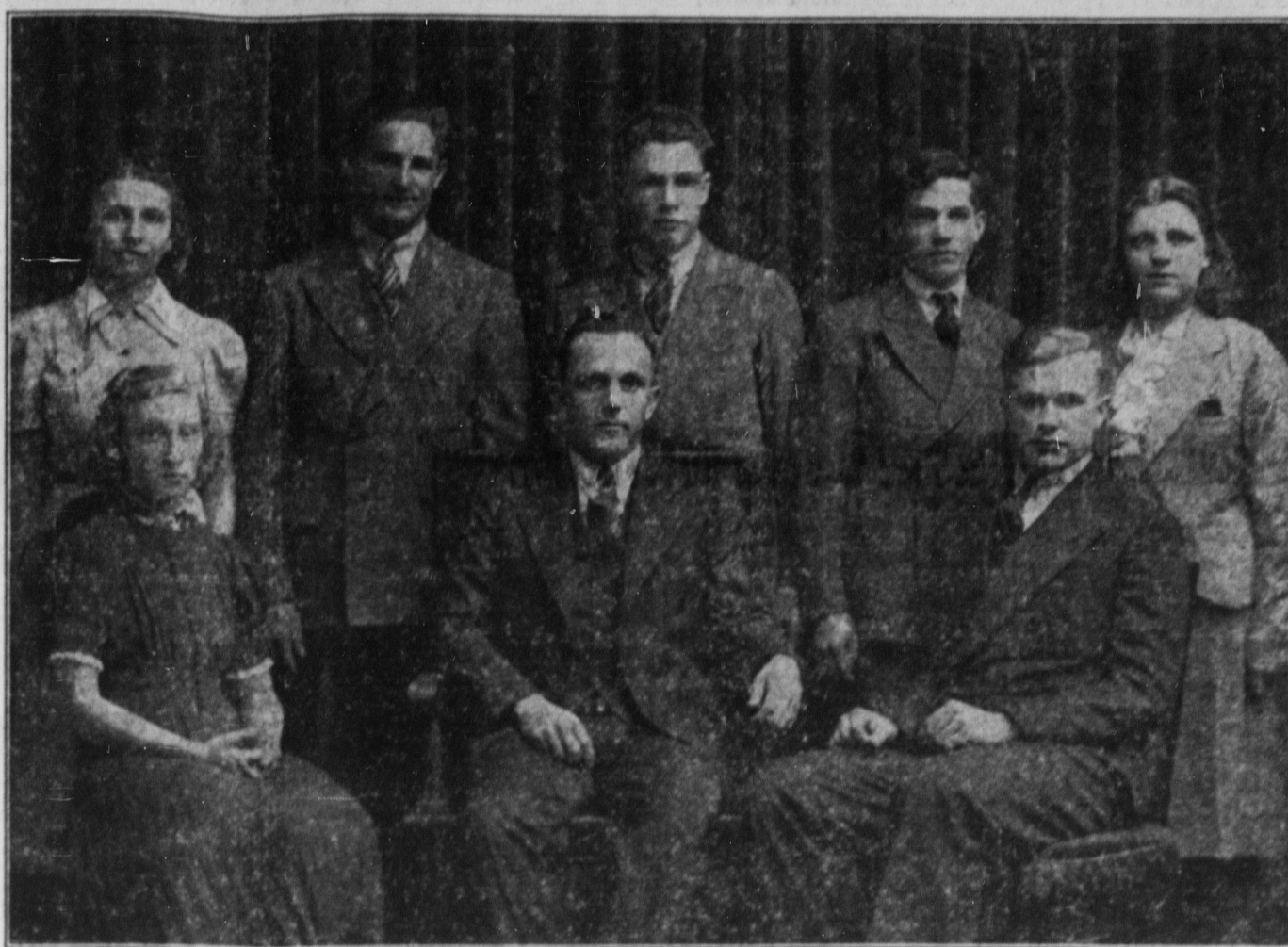
The citizens' committee letter sets forth that the board adopted the resolution in recognition of overwhelming sentiment of Bellefonte citizens that the present site be retained, and adds that the sentiment has been translated into formal petitions, signed by 1,111 voters. The population of Bellefonte in the 1930 census was 4,804.

The letter further adds that of the whole number of voters asked to sign the petitions, 11 declined to do so, and that of these 11, six voiced preference for the present site but asked to be excused from signing for personal or business reasons.

It is stated in the letter that by far the greater number of the petitioners are women—mothers of Bellefonte school children. The husbands of many of these women were at their employment when their homes were visited and did not have an opportunity to sign, it is explained.

A copy of the letter to Dr. Ade has been sent to the school board.

Juniata Youth Knifed In Brawl

Member of CCC Camp in Serious Condition With Slashed Abdomen

Stabbed during an early Tuesday morning brawl at the New Inn, just outside the Altoona city line, Edward Gebhart, 22, of Juniata, remains in a serious condition at the Altoona Hospital.

Gebhart, a member of a Virginia CCC camp and at home on a furlough, was severely slashed across the abdomen and lay over an hour on the porch of the inn before being taken to the hospital by ambulance.

Slated to return to the CCC camp as his leave of absence had expired, Gebhart with several companions, James Allen, Samuel Matthews and Robert Kelly, went to the inn Monday night where they spent several hours before Allen took all but Gebhart to their homes in his automobile.

Returning to the inn, Allen said he found Gebhart lying on the porch. State motor police, who were summoned, directed the injured man to be removed to the hospital. An emergency operation was performed, the injured man being cut in such a manner that his intestines were exposed and his liver punctured.

Two Altoona men have been held for questioning, but no formal charges have been filed against them.

Cars operated by John A. Redding, Oscola Mills, and John Harris, of Altoona, collided Saturday night two miles north of Bald Eagle on the Tyrone mountain road. No one was injured. Motor police said driving conditions were poor at the time because of the heavy rainfall.

Senate Passes The 'Slave Bill'

Rushed Through in Spite of Bitter Opposition of Democrats

The Van Alsbury relief revision bill, stamped by Democratic Senators as a "slave bill," a measure forcing persons on relief "to work or starve," was rushed through the Senate this week over bitter opposition and forwarded to the House for almost certain approval.

Democrats hammered at the bill, which is sponsored by Senator Henry J. Pierson, Republican, of Lancaster, for more than two hours, only to see it approved, 26-21, when one of their own members, Senator Joseph P. Dando, of Schuylkill, voted with the Republicans to give the measure the constitutional majority it otherwise lacked.

With the legislature slated to adjourn this week, the bill was pushed through the Senate in record time, being introduced Friday and receiving first and second readings, all in one day, with final passage Monday.

The Pierson bill is believed to embody the conviction of Speaker of the House Ellwood J. Turner and with the overwhelming Republican majority there it is apparently slated for House approval.

The bill would compel county relief boards to apportion out relief labor to public and private enterprises. Relief recipients who refused to work would be refused relief. Persons receiving special assistance, such as blind pensions, would be exempted.

Both public and private industries using relief labor would pay the "prevailing rate" for their locality as determined by the county board. When the job terminated, the relief recipient would again be eligible for assistance.
