Seek to Clarify **School Question**

Citizens Ask State Department to Act at Once on Building Site Matter

In a letter this week to Lester K. secretary of the Department of Public Instruction, a Bellefonte citizens' committee, headed by Mrs George B. Thompson as chairman, asks that if the Department must act in the matter of a site for a new high school building here, such action be taken as soon as possible

The request was made apparently to clear the issue stated in a resolution passed by the school board on April 10, in which the board goes on record as favoring the present site if that site is approved by the Department of Public Instruction, and if the cost of construction on that site is not materially greater than on a new site.

The citizens' committee letter sets forth that the board adopted the resolution in recognition of overwhelming sentiment of Bellefonte citizens that the present site be retained, and adds that the sentiment has been translated into formal petitions, signed by 1.111 voters. The population of Bellefonte in the 1930 census was 4,804.

The letter further adds that of the whole number of voters asked to sign the petitions, 11 declined to do so, and that of these 11, six voiced preference for the present site but asked to be excused from signing for personal or business

It is stated in the letter that by far the greater number of the petitioners are women-mothers of Bellefonte school children. The husbands of many of these women were at their employment when their homes were visited and did not have an opportunity to sign, it

A copy of the letter to Dr. Ade has been sent to the school board
