FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Give Peonies Support—Specialists in ornamental horticulture at the Pennsylvania State College recommend proper support for peony plants to prevent bending when the blooms open. Ants gathering on peony buds merely gather the sticky substance on the buds.

Farmers and City Workers—Agriculture provides a market for the city worker, claim Penn State specialists. From him the farmer buys machinery, fertilizer, transportation, building supplies, as well as magazines, newspapers, books, and motion pictures.

Ensilage—Greater and more economical utilization of home-grown feeds is made possible by ensiling grasses, clovers, alfalfa, soybeans and green cereals, says Penn State extension agronomists. Grass silages usually are high in protein and carotene, both of which are desired in dairy feeds.

Give Vegetables Room—As a vegetable grows, it requires more room, and this fact has prompted Penn State extension specialists in vegetable gardening to remind that too often gardeners fail to thin their crops. Thinning and high yields go hand in hand.

Farmer's Field Day—It is anticipated that approximately 5,000 farmers and others will attend the annual Farmer's Field Day at the Pennsylvania State College on June 15. Anyone interested may attend. The work of the School of Agriculture and Experiment Station will be inspected by the public.

Rape Provides Swine Pasture—No cheaper feed than pasture crops is available on most farms for growing livestock, believe Penn State extension specialists. Since clover and alfalfa pastures are not available, they suggest sowing rape to provide forage during winter and fall.

How to Fly the Flag



"FLAG DAY" will be celebrated on June 14th in more than 1,500 cities throughout the United States by Elks lodges. John W. Breen, in these and in many other cities, will be large numbers of religious, civic and patriotic organizations and citizens. The Elks are the only national patriotic organization which makes the observance of Flag Day mandatory on its subordinate branches. In connection with this occasion, and with other days throughout the year when the flag is flown, such as "Decoration Day" and "Independence Day," the simple instructions, illustrated above, are given for the use of householders, members of local committees and others charged with flying the flag during local celebrations. Incidentally, the Army and the Navy both fly the flag in the rain, but use special storm flags. It is the ordinary type of flag to be considered disrespectful. In flying the flag, but one rule, generally speaking, obtains: whenever and wherever it is flown, it should be flown in a manner indicating respect for the flag.
