Leaders Start Survey of Fall Election Plans

(Continued from page one) to approve a charter bill giving voters of Philadelphia the right to pass on it would be a campaign issue.

In addition to nominating party candidates at the September primary, the voters will have an opportunity to register their sentiment on the "wet" and "dry" question in many municipalities.

Dry Vote The Pennsylvania Anti-Saloon League estimated 500 townships and boroughs would take advantage of the local option provision of the liquor control law to let the voters decide whether retail sale of beer and liquor should continue within their limits.

At the last local option election in 1927 a total of 215 municipalities voted dry, 114 of them outlawing liquor and 101 voting on beer. Democratic State Chairman David L. Lawrence has said the state committee would be called into session sometime in July to endorse state-wide candidates for the two high courts.

Republican leaders have indicated there would be no action to endorse candidates.

The vacancies on the Supreme and Superior Court developed from the expiration of the terms of Supreme Court Justice John W. Kephart of Cambria county, and of those of President Judge William H. Keller of Lancaster county, and Judge Thomas J. Baldrige of Blair county, of the Superior Court. The third place on the Superior Court to be filled was caused by the resignation of Governor James.

Judge William E. Hirt, of Erie county, named to the James vacancy, has announced his candidacy for a full term on the Superior Court bench. Republican leaders expect that Judge Keller and Baldrige may run for re-election. Judge Keller has also been mentioned as a possible candidate for the Supreme Court.

A three-way contest for the Republican nomination for the Supreme Court already has developed. Justice Kephart, ineligible for re-election, has endorsed Judge Marion D. Patterson, of Blair county, as his successor. Judge Sara M. Boyle, of the Allegheny county court, has announced her candidacy on both Republican and Democratic tickets. In addition, the Dauphin County Bar Association has endorsed George Ross Hull, of Harrisburg. Speaker Ellwood J. Turner, of Delaware county, also has been mentioned.

On the Democratic side Judge J. H. McCann, of Cambria county, has come out for the Supreme Court nomination. Other Democrats mentioned are former Attorney General Guy K. Bard, Judge Curtis Bok, of Philadelphia, and Judge Ralph H. Smith and Judge Michael Mummolo, both of Pittsburgh. State Senator Samuel L. Gibson, of Erie, has been talked of as a possible Democratic candidate for the Superior Court. Rep. Herbert B. Cohen, Democratic floor leader of the House for the last two sessions, has been mentioned for both the Supreme and Superior Courts.
