Penn State To Graduate 1,000
Graduation Exercises Monday; Award Diplomas for Advanced Work
The Pennsylvania State College will graduate a class of over one thousand on Monday for the first time in history, according to William S. Hoffman, registrar.
Although the present list of recipients of baccalaureate degrees is still tentative, there are 1080 seniors slated for bachelor of arts and bachelor of science degrees. More than a hundred will receive advanced degrees, Hoffman said.
Those receiving baccalaureate diplomas represent sixty-four of Pennsylvania's sixty-seven counties, twelve other states, and two foreign countries. Less than a hundred of the graduates reside outside the Commonwealth.
Because of the record size of the graduating class, college officials have decided to hold graduation out-doors for the first time in many years. The ceremonies will be held on New Beaver Field which has a seating capacity of 12,000.
Commencement activities will get under way Friday. On Saturday, several thousand alumni are expected to return for class reunions. The baccalaureate service, dedicated to the class of 1889, and class day exercises are scheduled for Sunday. Commencement will be held at 10:30 a. m. Monday.
