FARMERS OF STATE PREFER THE WEEKLY NEWSPAPER

That Pennsylvania farmers are on their toes and more than keeping pace with the news of a swiftly moving world in their own communities as well as in national and world affairs, is disclosed by a survey made by The National Fertilizer Association of the reading habits of more than 32,000 farmers. The survey reports that more than 5 out of 10 of the State's farmers take a weekly newspaper. This represents a gain of 4 percent in Pennsylvania, farmer-readers of weekly papers over the results of a similar survey made by The National Fertilizer Association 10 years ago. The National Fertilizer Association survey was conducted to determine farming practices in the use of fertilizer and to learn the source of information which farmers use and rely upon. According to a recent study of contents of other papers farmers read, showed that general news although demanded, does not take the place of neighborhood and personal news which is of prime interest to farmer readers. Weekly newspapers, with their facilities for gathering and printing intimate local news, fill this requirement and therefore hold an increasing popularity among rural readers.
