
## CHARLES WILLIAM KORMAN

It was reported that the borough Tax Collector has been notified that Council will accept nothing except a surety bond before the 1939 tax duplicate is turned over to that official.

Mr. and Mrs. Paul Carner, of North Thomas street, in a letter praised Council's action in repairing Thomas street, and in the manner in which the work was done.

Those in charge of the Ordway and Grauer estates are to be notified to remove the weeds and tall grass from the vacant lots on East Linn street, just below the Francis Crawford residence. Council decided in general, where weeds and tall grass on vacant lots are not removed, to authorize borough employees to remove such weeds and to bill the property owners for the work.

Council unanimously passed a motion giving Philip Saylor equal authority with James D. Selbert in signing Water Department checks. The move was made to prevent delays in the event of the absence of one or the other of the Water Department's chief officers.

A new water ordinance unanimously passed its first reading, Monday night. The ordinance provides the same rates for services as did the former one, the only difference in the new law being that it provides penalties for failure to pay water rentals.

Plans for a new home to be erected on East Curtin street by Charles E. Martin, manager of the Central Pennsylvania Gas Company, were unanimously approved by Council.

ed away by the committeemen, and these items, numbering about 100, were fired last night.

Tuesday afternoon while members of the firing committee were about to set up the various displays, a rumble of thunder was heard and work ceased immediately. The Logan Fire Company was called, and trucks rushed salvage covers to the athletic field, where the fireworks

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were quickly covered. They survived a drenching rain without damage, and late in the afternoon when the skies cleared and the sun broke through the clouds, the committee continued its work.

As the Wetzel Band, of Milesburg, played an hour's concert before the display, threatening clouds approached from the southwest, and Chamber of Commerce officials in charge of the event, fearing rain, gave the order to begin firing at 8:10 o'clock, twenty minutes before schedule.

Every available parking space on the Hughes athletic field and on roads leading to the sports park was in use and in the storm there was much confusion as spectators ran blindly through the torrential rain to gain the shelter of their cars. More than an hour elapsed before all cars finally got under way.

## Four Injured As Driver Falls Asleep

Two persons were admitted to the Centre County Hospital for treatment and two others were less seriously injured about 12:45 o'clock Tuesday morning when the car in which they were riding left the road just east of Jacksonville, rolled over several times and came to rest in a ditch.

Harry W. Musser, aged 28, of Lock Haven, driver of the car, and Ella Verna Miller, 31, of Flemington, were brought to the local hospital for treatment. Musser was thrown about 20 feet from the demolished

car and suffered lacerations of the right hand, bruises of the face and chest injuries. Miss Miller, who was thrown face down in a small stream and remained unconscious for some time after being removed from the water, suffered deep lacerations of the right leg, cuts of the right arm and back injuries.

Joseph Ricker, of Youngstown, had slight chest injuries and a laceration of the forehead while a fourth passenger, an Ohio woman, was not injured. The injured persons were brought to the local hospital by W. H. Kesinger, of near Howard.

The accident was caused, police report, when the driver fell asleep at the wheel.

Fifty-seven of the 225 cooperative dairy bull associations in the United States are in Pennsylvania, according to recently released figures of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.



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
