

Charged With Shooting Man

had to have made from the time of his arrest at Tyrone on Friday, June 10, ten days after the fatal shooting occurred, and last Friday morning when the suspect was given a lie detector test.

The confession allegedly given to State Police, and which the lie detector failed to change is that Williams was hunting groundhogs on the Joe Gursallus farm just across the creek from Martin's Grove on the afternoon of June 20, when he fired at what he believed was the head of a groundhog. He then noticed something wrong, he said, ran to the spot and identified the body, and then ran home, too frightened to tell police of the error.

Williams was taken to the scene of the shooting where he is reported to have showed officers the place where the shot was fired from the spot where Winters was found dead.

The other version of the shooting was revealed in a confession Williams is said to have made in the Tyrone borough jail office Monday evening of last week, after he had been grilled by Chief of Police A. D. Mencer, of Tyrone.

Williams, in this alleged confession, stated his home had been broken up by another man, and that as a result his wife had left him. He said he started out to seek revenge and had shot Winters in mistake, the shooting having taken place at 3:45 o'clock on the afternoon of June 20, and having been done with a 22-caliber rifle.

State Police and Deputy Sheriff Lee Tice, together with District Attorney Muser W. Gettig, worked tirelessly in the investigation, seeking to prove or disprove the two alleged confessions. When the lie detector, used as a last resort, failed to substantiate the reputed Tyrone confession, police filed a charge in line with the "mistake" version.

The penalty for shooting a human being in mistake for game is a sentence of from 2 to 5 years in prison, plus a probable fine of from \$500 to \$1000 for the use of the rifle and the payment of the deceased. In default of the payment of the amount for the family, the defendant may be required to serve an additional year in prison.

When asked at the hearing, Friday, whether he pleaded guilty or not guilty to the charge which had been read to him by Squire Cowher, Williams readily entered a plea of "guilty," and it was not necessary for officers to present any of their testimony. The proceedings were brief and aside from officers only a few spectators were present. After being bound over for court, Williams was returned immediately to the county jail.

George Winters left his home at Martin's Grove on the afternoon of June 20, telling his wife he was going to hunt groundhogs. When he failed to return home that night, his wife became alarmed and instituted a search which resulted in the finding of the man's lifeless body early the next morning in a field on the Joe Gursallus farm across Beech Creek from the Winters home.

There was evidence that the man had moved after being struck in the head by a bullet, and Winters' body was found lying on top of his loaded and cocked 22-caliber rifle. At a subsequent inquest at the Centre County Hospital, Bellefonte, physicians testified that Winters could not have loaded and cocked his rifle after being shot in the head, thus ruling out a theory of suicide. Fragments of a 22-caliber bullet which had scattered through the slain man's head after penetrating the skull, were sent to the State Police laboratories at Hershey for examination by ballistic experts.

The coroner's jury returned a verdict that the bullet which had resulted fatally for the groundhog hunter had been fired "with homicidal intent."

Among those questioned during the investigation of the shooting, it was revealed, was Frank Myers, a neighbor of Williams, who produced a 22-caliber rifle which he said Williams had borrowed from him the Sunday before the fatal shooting. Williams had his hunting license revoked a year ago when he admitted taking a beaver from another hunter's trap.

The information against Williams charges that the fatal bullet was fired from a 22-caliber, 5-shot Winchester bolt-action rifle. Whether this rifle is the one supposedly loaned by Myers was not revealed.

GRADUATE OF PENN STATE WINS BEAUX-ARTS PRIZE A graduate of the Pennsylvania State College in architecture, George A. Downs, of Reading, has been named winner of the annual Paris Prize competition of the Society of Beaux-Arts Architects.

Downs received a \$3600 scholarship for two-and-one-half years' study in Europe and incidental allowances for transportation and other items, bringing the total of the cash prize to more than \$4000.

The Beaux-Arts prize is the second, major architectural scholarship won by a graduate of Penn State in the last two weeks. Joseph F. Balis, of Philadelphia, received the Daniel H. Burnham fellowship awarded by the American Academy in Rome.

Charles C. Taylor, of West View, also a graduate of the College, was one of two architects who received honorable mention in the competition won by Balis. Both Balis and Taylor graduated from Penn State in 1936, while Downs was a member of the class of 1937.

Downs was chosen winner of the Paris Prize on the basis of three designs drawn under the grueling conditions prescribed for finalists. He and his fellow nine finalists were confined in separate cubicles for thirty-six hours without books or conversation on each of three weekends. During each confinement a different architectural problem was assigned.

Downs and the other finalists designed a "municipal labor mart" or city employment bureau, a music hall, and a Beaux-Arts ball with an undersea motif.

Balis, winner of the Rome award, will receive \$1500 a year for two years beginning October 1, with free residence and studio at the American Academy in Rome. Sixty-two architects entered this contest. The fourteen finalists were asked to design a high school in a small Pennsylvania city to accommodate 1500 students, the site being a large, flat, low area used as a city dump.

PENN STATE MAN TELLS OF JAPANESE BEETLES Well-watered and closely clipped lawns are preferred by Japanese beetles as a place for hatching their eggs, H. E. Hodgkins, extension entomologist with the Pennsylvania State College, says. Each female beetle lays from 60 to 70 eggs during her life, depositing them at a depth of 2 to 4 inches in the soil. They dislike laying their eggs in waste or weedy land.

The eggs hatch in 10 to 12 days, with the young insects spending the summer in the ground feeding on the finer roots of weeds and grasses. This is the reason, he says, that infested lawns often become dry and brown.

The adult beetles emerge during the following spring and summer. These are the insects that eat the tissues between leaf veins and skeletonize the leaves.

Hodgkins is the author of Circular 213, "Protecting Trees, Plants, Shrubs and Lawns from the Japanese Beetle," recently published by the agricultural extension service of the Pennsylvania State College. It provides detailed information on Japanese beetles and explains methods for their control.
