Hardships of The Pioneer

(Continued from page one) man alternately. When the log-rolling contest was completed, they set to work, provided with hand-saws, and each company exerted itself to make more log heaps than the other.

"Nothing was charged for the work, and the only thing exceptional in these frolics, was the immoderate use of whiskey. Great hilarity prevailed, and many times fist fights led to serious injuries to those who took part in the jamboree.

In addition to log-rolling frolics, there were frolics to haul dung, to husk corn, and to raise buildings. The corn husking was done at night. The corn previously pulled was hauled in a pile near the crib. The invited neighbors joined in the work, and the corn husks began to fly. The whiskey bottle went round and round. The story, the laugh, and the merry song was heard.

"Three or four hundred bushels were usually husked by 9 or 10 o'clock, when a plentiful supper was provided. Sometimes the frolic ended with a stage dance—that is, the men and boys (without females) would dance like mad devils, but in good humor, to the tune of a neighbor's cat-gut and horse-hair, not always drawn with the best judgment.

"Buildings were constructed of heavy logs, on an average 24 feet long by 20 wide. Sometimes they were placed on a foundation wall a foot or more above the ground, but in general, four large stones were laid at the corners, and the building raised on them.

The house was covered sometimes with shingles, sometimes with clap-boards. The advantage of the latter kinds of roof lay in the fact that it required no laths, no rafters, no nails, and was put on in less time. It was called a poor man's makeshift, and its use could only be justified by the poverty and other circumstances of the country at the time.

"The ground logs were laid saddle shape. The ends of the upper edge were cut in with an axe. Then the end logs were raised and a notch cut to fit the saddle. This was the only kind of roof binder they had. When the building was raised as many rounds as it was intended, the ribs were raised, on which a course of clap-boards was laid, the butts resting on a butting pole.

"The press pole was laid on the clap-boards, immediately over the ribs to keep them from shifting by the wind, and the pole was kept to its berth by stay blocks, resting in the first course against the butting pole.

"The logs were run up on the building on skids by the help of wooden forks. The most experienced axemen were placed on the building as 'corner-men.' The rest of the company were on the ground to carry the logs and run them up.

"In this way a building was raised and covered in a day, without a mason, and without a pound of iron. The doors and windows were afterwards cut out as the owner pleased.

"For windows, oiled paper was used in place of glass, as leaded glass was high in price on account of the stamp tax on each pane of glass.

"The women assisted the men in all kinds of work connected with the clearing of the land, erecting their log houses, making fence, and in putting out and harvesting the crops.

"In summer, farmers worked from sunrise till sunset, allowing an hour for breakfast, and the same for dinner. In the winter they breakfasted by candle-light, and started in to work before dawn of day.

Hunters Will Have Month of Gunning

(Continued from Page 1) son for trapping raccoons, in counties declared open, starts Nov. 10 and closes Jan. 31, 1940.

Trapping for mink, opossums and skunks also will begin Nov. 10, and close the same date as the raccoon trapping season.

Bear season, which last year covered one week, will be only four days, Nov. 15 to Nov. 18, inclusive. Deer hunters will shoot only bucks this year, from Dec. 1 to Dec. 15, with two or more points to one antler, except in four counties. They are Warren and Forest, part of Potter county north of U. S. Highway 6, and part of Jefferson county northwest of U. S. Highway 119.

In these counties bucks will be hunted from Dec. 1 to 13, inclusive, and during the two remaining days hunters who have not killed a deer, or who have not assisted a hunting party in killing the camp limit, may kill antlerless deer without special permits.
