### TRAFFIC LIGHTS

ized the Fire and Police Committee to report at the next meeting on the cost of purchasing and operating four lights. Several Councilmen expressed the opinion that traffic lights are urgently needed, while only one voiced a dissenting opinion.

Purchase of an addressing machine for preparing and mailing quarterly water and sewer tax statements was unanimously approved when the Water Committee reported that the machine will do in less than two hours' time a task that now required several weeks. The cost of the machine, together with 1000 plates for addresses, is \$325.25.

The floating debt of the Water Department was reduced by \$500, making a total of \$1900 reduction in the debt during the past month, and \$7600 so far this year. Only \$6000 remains to be paid until the department's floating debt is liquidated.

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Council fixed the surety bond for Tax Collector O. A.
