2 Plead Guilty In Court Here

sentary, instead of at the Workhouse. He was informed that since he violated a parole from the Workhouse, he would have to serve out his original term there, which expires in September 1940, but for the additional 1 to 2 years the Court granted the request for a change to the State prison.

Bower was specifically charged with passing forged checks, for \$25 each at the R. T. Willard store, the Bellefonte Hardware store, and on Bellefonte's Mayor, Hardman P. Harris. Chief of Police Harry Dukeman, the prosecutor, told the Court that Bower also had passed forged checks for \$25 each on Jack Harper, at State College, and the A. & P. store and Montgomery Store, Bellefonte, and a \$15 check at the Harry C. Yeager Store, Bellefonte. Dukeman reported that when the checks were turned over to him, he traced Bower to the Hotel Henry, Pittsburgh, and instructed the Sheriff of Allegheny County to arrest him there. Meanwhile, however, Bower hitchhiked back to Bellefonte and gave himself up to authorities.

Mike Balch of Conemaugh Rockwell prison inmate who left the institution on the afternoon of July 14 while working in a wheat field, was asked by the Court why he escaped when he had only until April 1940 to serve of his sentence for robbery and receiving stolen goods.

Brech replied he didn't know why he fled the institution and had nothing further to say. He received an additional term of from 1 1/2 to 3 years. The prisoner was turned up to authorities, in connection with the burning of the Cape of Chief of Police John R. Jude, of State College, in the College Heights section of that borough.
