used to die early next Monday but their execution was stayed by the pardons board for a new hearing late in September.

Asked about the executions which had been performed by "Mr. X" had they not been delayed.
Elliott, who has sent more than 200 persons to death at Rockview is gravely ill at his New York home. He will be unable to throw the switch at scheduled executions in Massachusetts and New York.

In a recently published autobiography Elliott related that he began his grim task to make death in the electric chair more humane. He is gravely efficient as he moves about the death chamber.
Elliott is widely known in Bellefonte through his frequent official business trips to this community. Although he is of a quiet, unassuming disposition, he has formed a number of firm friendships among residents of the area.

Referendums May Be Blocked

and Boggs township.
According to reports the petitions to be filed today will request the County Commissioners to take action with respect to the petitions filed some time ago calling for local option votes. (The nature of the "action" desired of the Commissioners was not clear last night, but most observers were of the opinion that the petitioners want the county representatives to definitely declare they are, or are not, going to include local option questions on the ballots in the districts which have petitioned for referendums.) With the Commissioners' stand clear, it was suggested, those seeking to ban the referendums would then have a basis for future action.
The petition, it is claimed, will raise a question as to the legality of the earlier petitions asking for referendums.
Today's petitioners will set forth that the law requires that a period of 60 days intervene between an election at which a local option vote is taken, and the general municipal election. This fall, only 56 days intervene between the primaries and the general election. In some counties the Commissioners are banning local option votes for this reason. In other counties the Commissioners are ignoring the 60-day provision.
The petitioners today also will question the legality of the earlier petitions on the grounds that some signers' names appear two or three times, and that some signers are not qualified voters.
Last week, before the present anti-referendum move became generally known, the County Commissioners issued a statement in which they said that referendums would be held in each borough and township from which petitions have been received with the exception of a beer referendum in Boggs township. The law provides that referendums may be held only every four years in a district, and in Boggs township the beer question was voted upon in 1937. Hence that district is not entitled to another vote at this time, the Commissioners contend.
In issuing their statement, the Commissioners said their action is subject to any rulings of court on questions concerning the legality of petitions and elections.
Last night the Commissioners' offices reported that the Board is "standing pat" on its earlier statement. A spokesman explained the action expected to be filed today is a move seeking a court injunction against the Commissioners to restrain them from including the local option questions on ballots for certain districts.
