

OBITUARY

GEORGE CHARLES GLENN

George Charles Glenn, for many years constable and police officer in Bellefonte, died suddenly at his home on Ridge street at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, of a heart condition. A week ago Mr. Glenn suffered the first of a series of heart attacks but on the day before his death had walked down town. He had planned to go out Tuesday on a business mission but changed his plans. Death came suddenly a short time after he had walked from a davenport in the living room to a chair in the dining room, where he was conversing with his wife. Mr. Glenn was a son of David M. and Catherine Ramer Glenn and was born in Central City, Boggs township, on August 28, 1867, making his age at time of death 71 years, 11 months and 5 days. He was united in marriage with Annie Lingle, who survives with a son and three daughters: James and Mrs. Leslie N. Shaw, both of Bellefonte; Mrs. Philip Yessler, of York, and Mrs. Anna Latson, of Rochester, N. Y. Also surviving are two sisters: Mrs. James Dawson and Mrs. Edward Stover, both of DuBois. Funeral services will be held from the late residence on Ridge street at 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon, with the Rev. H. Willis Hartsock, pastor of the Methodist church, officiating. Interment will be made in the Union cemetery. Mr. Glenn was a member of the Methodist church, and for many years was a police officer in Bellefonte. For more than 20 years he had been constable of the south ward, a position he held at the time of his death.

JOHN H. SANDS LANE

John H. Sands Lane, native of Bellefonte and president of the Maryland Textile Weaving Company of Baltimore, Md., died suddenly at his home in Baltimore on Saturday morning. He was in his early 50's. Mr. Lane was a son of John and Louisa Sands Lane and was born in Bellefonte. He married the former Maude Entwistle, of Boston, Mass., who survives with these brothers and sisters: James B. Lane, Leetonia, Ohio; Fred E., of Johnstown, and Elliott E., Lane and Mrs. Patty Lane Fay, Bellefonte. Mr. Lane received his early education in the Bellefonte public schools and attended the Woodbury Forest preparatory school in Vir-

ginia. Later he went to New York City where he learned the weaving trade. For the past 30 years he had been president of the Maryland Textile Weaving Company. Mr. Lane was a 33rd degree Mason and recently completed a term as commander of the Knights Templar in Maryland. He was a visitor with Bellefonte relatives and friends during the July 4th holidays. Among those who attended the funeral services in Baltimore, Monday afternoon, were his brother and sister, E. E. Lane and Mrs. Patty Lane Fay, of Bellefonte.

MRS. JOSEPH T. NOLAN

Mrs. Rebecca Gardner Nolan, wife of Joseph Thomas Nolan, for many years a well known resident of Bellefonte, died at her home in Crider's Exchange apartments, North Allegheny street, at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon after an illness of more than a year's duration with a complication of diseases. She was a daughter of Philip and Sarah Long Gardner Lynch and was born at Roanoke, Va., on July 21, 1866, making her age at time of death 73 years and 11 days. She was united in marriage with Joseph Thomas Nolan, who survives with two daughters and a son: Kathryn Nolan MacNeilly, of Philadelphia; Elizabeth Ellen Nolan and William Henry Nolan, both at home. Also surviving are two brothers and two sisters: James Gardner, of Detroit, Mich.; P. L. Gardner, of Kansas City; Mrs. Harry Long and Mrs. Sarah Gardner, both of Columbus, Ohio. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon from the home in Crider's Exchange, with the Rev. Samuel H. Sayre, rector of St. John's Episcopal church, in charge. Miss Weaver became a member of the grade school faculty immediately after her graduation from the local High school, and she taught in all grades, at various times, until her resignation on June 8, 1931. The seventh grade was her "favorite" class. After her resignation Miss Carrie served as a substitute teacher until several years ago.
Surviving, in addition to the two sisters, Belle and Ida, both at home, is a brother, Henry, address unknown.

CELEBRATE ANNIVERSARY OF EVANGELICAL HOMES

Twelve hundred Evangelicals from churches in central Pennsylvania and Northern Maryland are expected at Lewisburg on Friday, August 4, for the 23rd annual anniversary of the Evangelical Homes for aged persons and orphans.
Delegations will attend from congregations in the Lewisburg, York and Williamsport districts of the Central Pennsylvania annual conference, in which there are 31,000 communicant members.
A feature of the program will be a memorial tribute to Dr. Winter whose death in December closed a period of 22 years as superintendent. He took charge of the Homes when they were founded in 1916 as a \$30,000 operation and built them to an investment of \$507,000. There are now 61 guests in the Home for Aged, and 41 children in the Orphanage.
Five of the children, having reached the graduating age of 18 years, will be graduated during Friday's exercises.
The large crowds will be entertained with picnic dinners and suppers on the spacious lawns about the homes.

MILK CONTROL COMMISSION TO HOLD PUBLIC HEARING

The Milk Control Commission will hold a public hearing in the Main Capitol Building, Senate Caucus Room No. 156, Harrisburg, on Friday, August 4, to receive evidence upon conditions to be met in the supplying of milk and certain milk products on milk orders issued to recipients of relief by the Department of Public Assistance of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. At this hearing, applying to all milk marketing areas established under the official general orders of the Milk Control Commission, testimony will be received concerning the prices to be charged for milk and certain milk products distributed on relief milk orders of the Department of Public Assistance; the prices to be paid milk producers for such milk products; and the revision of marketing area boundaries necessary for the most effective carrying out of the distribution of milk and certain milk products on relief orders.
The hearing will convene at 10 o'clock a. m. Eastern Daylight Saving Time, and all those interested in presenting evidence will have an opportunity to be heard.
