Mr. and Mrs. Fred Eckenroth moved recently into half the new double house T. E. Jodon is now having completed.

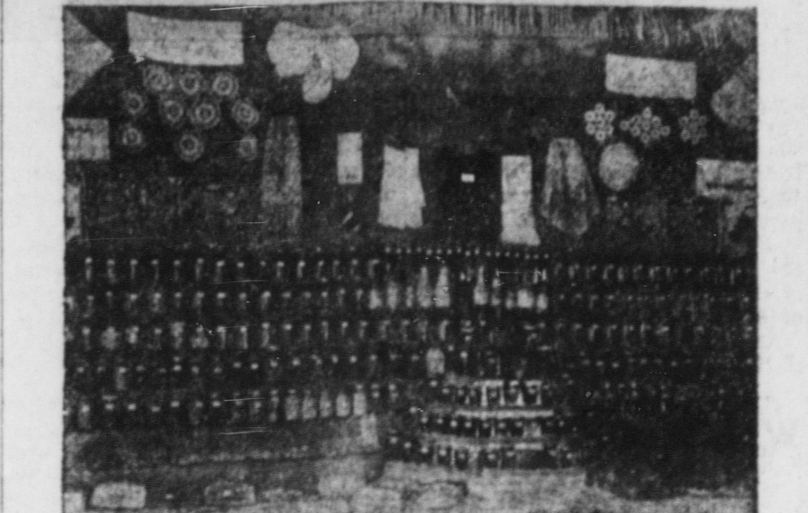
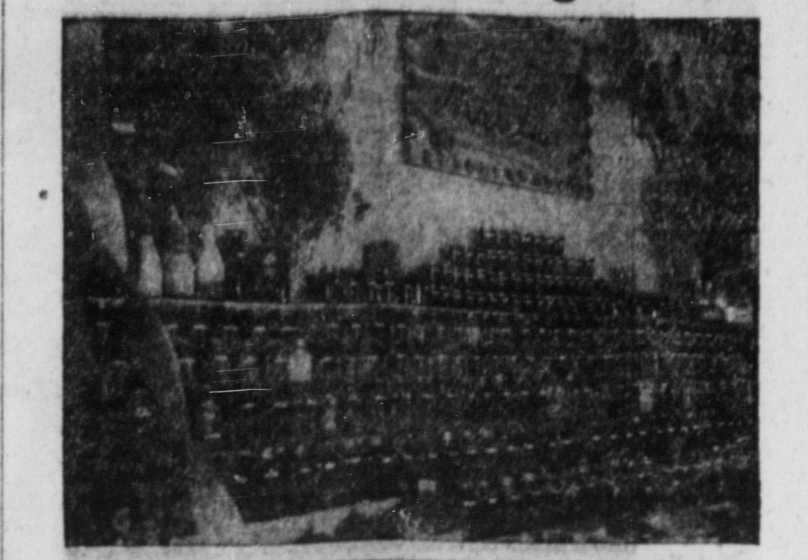
Mr. and Mrs. Bloomer Weaver and two sons, of Spring Mills, were callers of the Melroys Thursday evening.
