County Native Accident Victim

The jury deliberated only a half hour. Members were Dean H. Fredericks, Joseph M. Sharp, A. Wayne Myers, Carl J. Ohlson and Richard D. Edler, with William D. McClintock as foreman.

The witnesses were questioned by Dr. W. J. Shoemaker, county coroner; District Attorney Barrett, L. Haas, and A. H. Lipsch, counsel for the defendant. In addition to members of the jury.

Their composite testimony revealed that Mr. Spotts, a retired car inspector for the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, had been struck by the Hodick automobile about 9:30 p. m. as he was attempting to cross Bellefonte avenue diagonally from the south to the north side.

Traffic was heavy at the time, and Mr. Spotts was looking west when the Hodick car approached from the east. He had apparently stepped between moving automobiles in the eastbound line of traffic directly into the path of the Hodick car.

Mr. Hodick and his brother-in-law, Leo Sadowski, of Duysa, who was riding in the front seat with him, both testified that they did not see the man until he was within five feet of the car. The driver applied his brakes and swerved his car to the right in an unsuccessful attempt to avoid striking the aged man who was carrying a bag of peaches in his arms.

Measurements taken by Officers Ross B. Bortoff and William T. Devling of the city police force, who arrived on the scene a few minutes after the tragedy, showed that the car had skidded 20 feet before coming to a stop, that it had been proceeding west on the avenue in a line of traffic, and that the speed was not over 25 miles an hour.

The left front headlight was broken and the left front side of the hood caved in, indicating the point of contact, the noise of which was heard by many people in that area. The body, after being thrown 30 feet, came to rest in the middle of the street and was quickly taken over to the curb by Raymond A. and S. Alex Sadowski, brothers, who were standing in front of the Citizens Hose House nearby when the accident occurred.

Dr. Edward Hoeherman, who was summoned, found the man bleeding from the ear and the mouth. Internal injuries, sufficient to cause death, which had already taken place when he arrived.

Mr. Hodick and his passengers, Mr. Sadowski and Clair Bryan, also living on North Fairview street, quickly got out of the car and went back to the man to render what assistance they could.

There was no pedestrian cross-walk on the avenue where the victim had tried to cross to the other side. He had been seen walking west on the avenue just before the accident.

Mr. Hodick, who testified that he had been driving a car for 18 years without an accident, said it appeared to him that the man had crossed in front of a car traveling east and quickly stepped into the path of his car to avoid being struck by the eastbound one. Testimony brought out that he was wearing dark clothing.
