TO THE CITIZENS OF BELLEFONTE

The coming election of school directors is the most important held in many years. We, the candidates named below, have submitted the following statement for the information of voters who seek enlightenment on the situation:

Bellefonte, Pa., Sept. 6, 1939

We, the undersigned, have entered the contest for election to the Bellefonte School Board on the following platform:

- 1. To think and act independently.
2. To oppose any attempt to change the site of the High School building.
3. To make every effort to secure a higher standard for our High School.
4. To improve many of the conditions in grading and discipline.
5. To check up on every business proposition that will confront the directors and see to it that the taxpayer's money is well spent and accounted for.

6. To guarantee fair and impartial consideration for all appeals made by business men, parents, teachers, and pupils.
7. To complete our terms, unless sickness, death, or withdrawal from the town as a place of residence causes our resignation.
8. To discourage any playing of favorites, whether teachers or pupils.
9. To welcome to our board meetings newspaper men, parents, teachers, pupils, and any others interested in the educational welfare of our youth; and no reprisals of any kind will be allowed when parents, teachers, pupils, or business men have made complaints, as is their right to do.
10. To serve the public with fidelity, as is required in the oath taken by directors when they are about to assume the duties of their office.

We shall appreciate the support of those who desire to have our schools attain a more desirable status than has existed in recent years. turns to the front of the store, and passes through an aisle where an attendant checks over the items purchased.

The attendant sums up the bill, completes the sale and provides bags for the items and the customer then leaves the store by the same door through which he entered. You can take as little or as much time as you choose while shopping. Experience has shown that after a few visits to super-markets, customers readily learn where various items are to be found, and practically no time is lost.

The store will be heated by steam through power units suspended from the ceiling. In warm weather, several giant fans placed at advantageous points will provide fresh, circulating air. Modern lighting facilities will provide an abundance of illumination without glare. The store, of concrete and steel construction, is fire-resisting.

Contrary to the general belief, the absence of clerks in the grocery department of the super-market will

not reduce the number of clerks in A. & P. employ in Bellefonte, even though the large store on the Diamond closed last night. The clerical staff of the West High street store, headed by Grover Corman as manager, will remain unchanged.

At the super-market, all the employees of the Diamond store will be retained, and in addition, five new employees will be added to the regular staff. Manager of the super-market will be Guy Baughman, who has been in A. & P. employ for 16 years—13 of them as manager of the store on the Diamond. George Brown, also a veteran employe, will be Mr. Baughman's assistant. Herman Teaman, for 9 years in charge of the produce department at the Diamond, will continue in the same capacity in the new store, while Edward Miller, with 10 years experience as manager of the meat department in the store which closed last night, will be retained at the super-market in the same capacity. 2 Pilots Crash Near Clearfield

Torn Wing Fabric Blamed as Ship Plunges Four Thousand Feet

In a 4000 foot plunge from the sky, Dorsey Humphrey, Reynoldsville, pilot, and Wayne Witherow, Clearfield, aviator, were seriously injured Sunday afternoon near the Clearfield Municipal airport when their plane crashed into a wooded section and upset.

A crowd of spectators watching the plane piloted by Humphrey take part in the Clearfield Air Show saw the dramatic plunge and the final crash when the plane swooped over

the landing field, struck a tree and then overturned. Rescuers rushed to the scene and pulled the unconscious forms of the two aviators from the two-passenger plane. Witherow was pierced in the side of the body when a section of the wood tore through the plane. Both men were taken to the Clearfield Hospital where 23 stitches were required to close Witherow's wound. Humphrey was less seriously injured.

The crash is said to have been caused by a piece of fabric tearing loose from a wing and causing the pilot to lose control of the light ship. Witnesses to the crash said the plane hesitated momentarily in the air and then began its rapid descent before it heided for the woods. As a wing struck a tree the plane somersaulted and flopped to the ground.
