Mr. Carras looked for his shotgun and shells in order to stop the burglarly but was unable to locate the shells. He was successful, however, in getting a good look at the three men and in getting close enough to their automobile, parked near the florist shop on Second street, to get a description of the car and the license number. Chief of Police N. R. Lamoreaux was called and after checking the license number with State Motor Police headquarters in Harrisburg, Chief Lamoreaux notified Chief of Police Russell Love, of DuBois, to be on the lookout for the arrival of the men.

Chief Love and State Motor Police from the DuBois station arrested the driver of the car upon his arrival home. From the driver, the police learned the whereabouts of the other two men and picked them up. Chief Lamoreaux and Mr. Plank were notified of the arrest and went to DuBois to bring the three men back to Philipsburg. Chief Lamoreaux, when investigating the scene shortly after the robbery, took a number of plaster casts of footprints. It is expected that these prints will be useful in proving the innocence or guilt of the three men arrested, who are: Thomas D. Calvert, one-armed driver of the car; Barrie DePalma, and Ely Royer, all of DuBois.

County Prepares For Primaries

(Continued from page one) and township offices, and the local option issue in some districts, voters of major parties also will choose nominees for the Supreme and Superior Courts of Pennsylvania. Because two Centre Counties, one a Democrat and one a Republican, are candidates for the Superior Court, considerable interest is being manifested locally in the outcome of that division of the Primaries.

Referendums in 7 boroughs and 8 townships on the wet-dry issue are slated to be registered at the Primaries. The wets in some districts lost the first round in the county courts when they received an adverse ruling on their objections, on technical grounds, to local option votes. Dame Rumor, as usual, is expected to play an interesting, if not important part, in the Primary contests, for already there are being circulated the usual dark, underground reports which usually characterize the last days of most election campaigns.

Some observers yesterday predicted a comparatively light Primary vote. This prediction was based on the premise that many voters will not go to the polls unless there is some outstanding issue to be decided, and that factional strife has caused considerable lack of interest in the coming Primary. Others hold that the vote may be surprisingly heavy in view of the strong feeling existing in many of the districts in which local option is in issue. Final registration figures show that 24,902 Centre countians are qualified to vote. The County Commissioners last night reminded the voters of the west and south wards of Bellefonte that the polling places will be in the same location as last fall's election. The South ward will vote in the showroom of the Count Chevrolet & Race, at the corner of Allegheny and Bishop streets, and West ward residents will go to the County building (formerly one of the Potter-Hoy Hardware Company warehouses) on North Potter street, North Ward voters, as usual, will cast their ballots at the Logan Fire House, East Logan street. Those who are compelled to at-

tend the regular September term of Criminal Court which opens Monday, will not lose their votes, for the Court has called a recess for Tuesday, and no court proceedings will be held that day. Despite the large number of candidates on both tickets for county offices, it is expected that the semi-definitely known early Wednesday morning, for under the election code officers are required to bring returns to the Commission-ers' office as soon as the election board has completed its work, regardless of the hour. As a result of this innovation, newspaper tabulations of unusual accuracy usually are completed early Wednesday instead of in the afternoon as in the case when election boards brought in the returns at their own convenience.
