Fish Wardens Attend School

Session Shortened in Honor of Member Who Died enroute to Bellefonte

Leaders of Pennsylvania's half-million sportsmen will take part in the program of the summer meeting of The Pennsylvania Forestry Association to be held this month.

The Cook Forest Park has been selected for this year's meeting, which will be held on Friday and Saturday, September 22 and 23. An attendance of 300 foresters, sportsmen and conservationists is expected.

The program will attempt to dovetail the interest of the forester and the hunter. For many years there has been a feeling that game management has conflicted in one way or another with forest practices. Means will be sought to bring the two groups into complete harmony in the interest of conservation.

Speakers include Seth Gordon, executive director of the Pennsylvania Game Commission; Honorable G. Albert Stewart, Secretary of the Department of Forests and Waters; Wilbur K. Thomas, President of the Pennsylvania Forestry Association; John C. Youngman, President of the Sportsmen's Clubs; Francis R. Cooper, Vice President of The Pennsylvania Forestry Association; Dr. L. O. Bennett, Biological Survey; W. E. Montgomery, Department of Forests and Waters; James N. Morton, of the Pennsylvania Game Commission; and R. M. Evans, Regional Forester of the United States Forest Service.

Headquarters of the meeting will be Cook Forest Inn, and field trips to various sections of the Cook Forest and to the nearby Tionesta tract are planned. The Cook Forest Park itself contains 6,083 acres along the winding Clarion River. It adjoins 9,000 acres of Pennsylvania State Forest lands. The Park was given to the State by Thomas Cook, millionaire lumberman, who also gave Cook Mansion, which is now a part of Cook Forest Inn.
