Captain Nicholson was educated at the Columbia University School of Journalism, but later entered upon an industrial career. He has been connected with industry for the past twenty-six years, most of the time with The Texas Company, with which he started as a laborer, served as a craftsman, foreman, salesman, and finally rose to the position of personnel director.

The Captain also served in the World War, enlisting as a private and having been honorably discharged with the rank of major. He saw active service in practically every sector of the Western Front and was awarded the Croix de Guerre by the French government and two citations by the United States.

In his present position, Captain Nicholson has contacted virtually every important industrial plant in the United States, and for the past decade has made a close study of all phases of industrial economics. He is a staunch devotee of the principles and objectives of American business and industry.

During the past few years there has been a steady and ever-increasing demand for Captain Nicholson's services as a speaker. He has addressed large groups of executives and professional men throughout the country, and has been the principal speaker before such large audiences as those attending the Silver Jubilee of the National Safety Congress at Chicago, the annual convention of the American Legion at Austin, Tex., and the National Convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U.
