GEORGE HOWARD CRAIN

George Howard Crain, a brother of Mrs. Harry Peters, of Millersburg, died suddenly of a heart attack at his home in Altoona, Friday afternoon, Mr. Crain, a retired Pittsburgh division engineer, was born at Bald Eagle June 13, 1873, the son of Wesley and Sara (McMong) Crain. Members of the family include his widow, Mrs. Margaret (Shaughnessy) Crain, one son, four daughters, two brothers and four sisters.

ROBERT STERLING BENCE

Robert Sterling Bence, State College High School sophomore and an outstanding member of the State College American Legion and Auxiliary Junior Drum and Bugle Corps, died at the Centre County Hospital, Bellefonte, at 12:30 o'clock Monday morning after a four-week illness with a complication of diseases. A son of Sterling and Rachel Grazer Bence, he was born on March 29, 1925, making his age at time of death 14 years, 5 months and 26 days. He was one of the original members of the Junior drum corps and played various types of drums and cymbals with equal facility. He took a prominent part in various high school activities and was a member of the junior high school football team. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the home of the boy's uncle, S. S. Grazer, at Bakerton, Cambria County, followed by interment in that community. The honor escort from the Junior Drum and Bugle Corps participated at the services at the home and at the Methodist cemetery at Bakerton. Corps members were casketbearers, and all other members of the Corps were honorary pall bearers.

HENRY P. PROBST

Henry P. Probst, 59, died at 7:45 o'clock, Sunday morning at the home of Mrs. Sadie Kettler, Lock Haven, where he had been residing for 15 years. Mr. Probst had been ill for two years. The deceased was born at Swissdale, and was a lifelong resident of the locality. He was steward at the Eagles' Club and was a member of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, the I. O. O. F., the P. O. S. of A. and Hope Hose Company. For several years, he was a brakeman on the New York Central Railroad and later, an employe at the local plant of the New York and Pennsylvania Company. Surviving are a brother, Horace E., and four sisters, Mrs. John Brownlee, Mrs. Jacob Bryerton and Mrs. Dewey Kunes, all of Lock Haven, and Mrs. Eugene Garbrick, State College. Funeral services were held at the Kettler home at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, with the Rev. Jesse K. Gunder, pastor of the East Main Street Methodist Church officiating, assisted by the Rev. Homer W. Halsey, First Evangelical pastor, with burial in Highland cemetery.

REV. WESLEY J. CAMPBELL

The Rev. Wesley J. Campbell, of Lewisburg, father of Earl Z. Campbell, of Bellefonte, and of Rev. A. Ward Campbell, former pastor of the Bellefonte Evangelical church, died of a heart attack at the Evangelical Home, Lewisburg, at 2 o'clock Friday morning, where he had been under medical care since a previous attack last July 21. He was a retired Evangelical minister and former superintendent of the Williamsport and Lewisburg districts of the Central Pennsylvania Evangelical Conference. Had he lived another day, he would have celebrated his 71st birthday anniversary Saturday. Since retiring in 1937, after 47 years in the ministry, he had made his home at 121 Market street, Lewisburg. The Rev. Mr. Campbell

was born at Liberty, educated in Tioga county schools and at Central Pennsylvania College, New Berlin. He was ordained in 1890 and served pastorates at Sonestown, Du-shore, Glen Rock, Altoona, Nescopeck, St. Paul's church of Williamsport, Berwick and York. He was elected superintendent of Williamsport district in 1919 and followed that term by four years as superintendent of Lewisburg district. He leaves his widow and four children: the Rev. A. Ward Campbell, pastor of Grace Evangelical church, Altoona; Earl Z., of Bellefonte; Mrs. Edna Hoyt, of San Francisco, Cal., and Mrs. Ruth Bloom, of Williamsport. Ten grandchildren and a great-grandson also survive. He leaves a sister, Mrs. Lenore Sheffer, of Verona, and a brother, Jason E., of Pittsburgh. Funeral services were held in the St. Paul's Evangelical church, Lewisburg, Monday afternoon, with the Rev. Edward C. Hanson, pastor, officiating.

John William Sendzik, Jr., infant son of Mr. and Mrs. John William Sendzik, of State College, passed away at the Centre County Hospital, Tuesday, September 19, a few hours after birth.

JOSEPH CUTTER

Funeral services were held Saturday at Painesville, O., for Joseph Cutter, father of Mrs. Paul C. Sheffer, Jr., of East Linn street, Bellefonte. Mr. Cutter, who was 74 years old, died last Tuesday, of complications resulting from a stroke suffered several days before. He retired six years ago as a government employe. Surviving are his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Sheffer and Mrs. Forest Deeder, of Painesville, O., and one son, Henry, of California.

WILLIAM T. DILLON

William T. Dillon died at his home near Julian at 8:45 o'clock Monday morning after a long illness with a complication of diseases. A farmer by occupation, Mr. Dillon had not been able to work for the past five years. He was a son of James A. and Ellen Fieck Dillon and was born in Clearfield county on August 27, 1872, making his age at time of death 67 years and 28 days. His wife, the former Sallie Gill, preceded him in death. Surviving are two children: Willis C. Dillon, and Mrs. Virgil B. Heaton, both of Julian. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the Baptist church, Julian, in charge of the Rev. A. G. Herr, Bellefonte. Interment was made in the Julian cemetery.

MRS. ANNIE KREBS

Mrs. Annie Krebs, widow of the late Luther Krebs, former Pine Grove Mills resident, died at her home in Vallejo, Calif., Wednesday, September 6. She was born February 7, 1863, a daughter of Daniel and Mary Houser. Her husband preceded her in death 10 years ago. She is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Lucy Gebers, of Burlingame, Calif.; Mrs. Lena Hall, of Vallejo, Calif.; and Mrs. Mildred Forcade, of Salt Lake City, Utah, and one son, Walter Krebs, of Oxnard, Neb. A sister, Mrs. Alda Bloom, of Centre Hall, also survives.

DR. GEORGE W. HOSTERMAN

Dr. George W. Hosterman, former prominent Centre Hall dentist, died at the home of his son, Sumner Hosterman, Lancaster attorney, last Wednesday afternoon. The Hosterman family left Centre Hall some 20 years ago. Dr. Hosterman, who was in his 80's, is survived by two sons and a daughter: Sumner, of Lancaster; John, of Cleveland, Ohio, and Helen, residing in California. Funeral services were held in Lancaster, after which the body was brought to the Centre Hall cemetery where short commitment services were held Friday afternoon.

KLINE RUSSELL MILLER

Funeral services were held at his late home in Millheim Saturday afternoon for Kline Russell Miller, 20, who dropped dead at his work in the plant of the Millheim Journal at 4 o'clock last Wednesday afternoon. He had not been in good health for some time. He was born at Surveyor on December 21, 1918, a son of Kline and Sarah Wolfe Miller, who survive, with three sisters: Mrs. Florence K. Smith, Tampa, Fla.; Mrs. Dorothy A. Poorman, Emporium; and Miss Ruth Miller, Philadelphia. The deceased was a graduate of the East Penns Valley High school at Millheim. Funeral services were in charge of Rev. G. A. Fred Griesing, and burial was made in the Reformed cemetery at Madisonburg.

ANDREW MORRISON

Andrew Morrison, for the past 60 years a resident of Bellefonte, died at his home on East Howard street about 4:30 o'clock Monday morning after an illness with a complication of diseases incident to advanced age. He had not been in good health for some time and retired from active life about ten years ago. Mr. Morrison was a son of Robert and Isabel Gamble Morrison and was born in County Donegal, Ireland, on October 10, 1859, making his age at time of death 79 years, 11 months and 15 days. His wife, the former Mayme Morgan, died about 30 years ago. Surviving are these brothers and a sister: Alexander, Robert, James, John and Thomas Morrison, and Mrs. Jane Kerns, all of Bellefonte. Mr. Morrison came to this country as a young man and located in Bellefonte. At various times

he was employed by McCalmont & Co., the Bellefonte Cemetery Association, and the Bellefonte Borough. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon from the home of his brother, Alexander Morrison, on East Howard street, with the Rev. William C. Thompson, pastor of the Presbyterian church, officiating. Interment was made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

Phillipsburg was host to the State Christian Endeavor fall executive meeting on Saturday and Sunday, September 23 and 24. The headquarters was at the Hotel Phillips and sessions met in the Church of Christ, Lutheran and Presbyterian churches. On Sunday morning the leaders visited the various churches of the town, some being speakers in the morning worship services. The closing session of the meeting was conducted around the tables of the noon meal, served in the hotel dining room. The sessions were in charge of the State President, Harry B. Wilson Byers, second vice president, of Alliquipp; and Warren Hoopes, general secretary, of West Grove. HOLC REALTY SALES DRIVE IS RENEWED HERE

Contract Sales Brokers handling Home Owners' Loan Corporation properties in Pennsylvania are launching a sales drive intended to clear the market of homes now held by the Corporation in this area. Many desirable properties will be placed on sale in different sections of the state by the Contract Brokers and cooperating brokers.

As an indication of the increase in real estate activity in Pennsylvania, J. S. Baughman, State Manager for the HOLC, announced that since January 1, 1939, the Corporation has sold 1,586 properties in Pennsylvania valued at approximately \$6,000,000. For the three-year period prior to 1939, the Corporation sold 1913 properties in Pennsylvania for a total of approximately \$7,000,000. Mr. Baughman reports that terms offered by the HOLC enable the purchaser, after the initial down payment, to carry the property at approximately the same cost as present rental payments.

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In contrast to the large increase in commercial hatching, the number of young chickens per farm flock on July 1 was less than 3 per cent above 1938, the report stated. Total production of eggs per farm flock continues slightly above last year, the lower production per pen being more than offset by the larger number of layers. Prices continue from two to three cents per dozen below last year. The feed-egg ratio, based on Chicago prices, continues much less favorable for farmers than a year earlier, but is more favorable than the 1925-37 average.

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
