

COUNTY REGISTRATION HOLDS FIRM

DEMOCRAT STRENGTH DROPS ONLY 2.6 PER CENT IN YEAR

New Registrations Seen
As Chief Cause of G.
O. P. Margin

MINORITY PARTIES SHOW NO ACTIVITY

Other Gains Attributed to
Desire to Be With
Party in Power

Although a sharp swing toward the ranks of the Republican party could be expected since last fall when Democratic candidates received a severe defeat in the state-wide elections, the Registration figures to date, as released yesterday by the Centre County Commissioners, indicate that comparatively few persons have deserted the ranks of the minority party.

While Republican gains in the county since last fall total 988, only about one-third of them can be classed as having left the Democratic ranks to join the G. O. P., since the Democratic forces have lost only 311 registered members in the past year. It is safe to assume that practically two-thirds of the Republican gains represent persons who were not registered here last fall.

Total registration figures released reveal that the G. O. P. enters the coming county election with a membership of 13,648 voters, while the Democratic registration is 11,063.

In the car at the time were Mr. and Mrs. Gill and their daughter, Wanda, who were returning to Bellefonte from Altoona when the other machine, driven by a Tyrone resident, pulled from a side road and struck the side of the Bellefonte car.

Mr. Gill, a mechanic at the Hagen garage, Bellefonte, and his daughter, escaped with minor injuries. The family was brought to Bellefonte by a passing motorist and Mrs. Gill underwent medical treatment at the offices of a Bellefonte physician.

Elderly Woman Fractures Leg
Miss Ella Lucas, aged 74, of Howard, R. D., was admitted to the Centre County Hospital last Thursday afternoon to undergo treatment for a triple fracture of the leg suffered in a fall near her home. Her condition is reported to be satisfactory, but the injury will probably keep her bedfast for some time.

LIME WORKER IS KILLED

"Jack" Boldin Dies Few
Hours After Birth of
Daughter

Early last Thursday morning as a Bellefonte man toiled in the Chemical Lime Company plant near Coleville, a daughter was born at his home on Valentine Hill. Less than an hour later a rock loosened from the roof of the mine in which the father was working. The boulder fell and struck him, causing injuries which resulted in his death in the Centre County Hospital. He never learned of the birth of his daughter.

The victim of the mine accident was Evon Joseph Boldin, aged 32. He was injured about 4:45 o'clock Tuesday morning and died at the local hospital at 7:55 o'clock without regaining consciousness. The daughter was born at the Boldin family home on Valentine Hill.

Jacksonville To Get Electric Service

SEEK PATENT ON MACHINES

Milesburg Men Begin Production of New Type
Welding Units

Dewey P. Sherry and John M. Roberts, well known Milesburg residents, have applied for patents on alternating current welding machines and have begun production of the units at the Sherry welding plant in Milesburg.

The devices are said to be unique in several respects. First, there are no moving parts to wear out or get out of adjustment. Second, the machines are reported to weigh hundreds of pounds less than corresponding welders of other makes, and units for small welding jobs are readily portable by hand. Finally, the machines can be built to perform heavy welding jobs which heretofore could be done only by high-powered and ponderous direct-current machines.

In appearance the welding units are not unlike an ordinary cabinet model radio, with the exception that

Life under the Hitler regime in Austria is little more than a reign of terror, a native of that country who is temporarily located in Bellefonte told a representative of The Centre Democrat, Monday.

The man is Hugo Gruber, aged 45, an employe of the Industrial Plants Corporation, New York, purchaser of the machinery of the Eagle Silk Company plant on North Water street. Mr. Gruber is engineer in charge of dismantling the machinery and preparing it for shipment. The plant property was purchased last week by the Titan Metal Manufacturing Company, Bellefonte.

Gruber, a native of Austria and a graduate of the University of Vienna, had been employed as a mechanical and electrical engineer in an Austrian industry for twelve years prior to July when conditions

Van Zandt to Talk on Neutrality; Will Confer With
School Board

At the request of Hon. James E. Van Zandt, member of Congress from the twenty-third District, the Bellefonte Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a meeting to be held Friday, October 20, at 1:30 p. m. in the High school gymnasium at the Armory on North Spring street. This will be a public meeting and Congressman Van Zandt will discuss subjects of interest to the community.

The main purpose of the meeting is to discuss with the citizens the proposed modification or retention of the Embargo Act, its effect upon the neutrality of the United States in the present European war and its effect upon the businessmen of the community. Prior to the meeting, however, the Congressman will meet with the Bellefonte School Board and will, following that meeting, discuss the discussion on the Embargo Act with information concerning the status of funds for the proposed building of the Bellefonte High school.

Bellefonte Youth 'Runs' Sewage Plant

Charles Mox, aged 19, of Bellefonte, is the man behind the scenes at Bellefonte's new sewage disposal plant on the old fair ground property. Mox became operator of the plant several weeks ago upon receiving the appointment from the Bellefonte Borough Authority.

The youth was graduated from the Bellefonte High school in the class of 1938; learned the technique of sewage plant operation through a correspondence course, and knows the lay-out of the Bellefonte plant from beginning to end, having been employed on construction from the day the first spadeful of earth was turned until the property passed final inspection.

Experienced in the technical as well as the mechanical aspects of sewage plant operation, Mox is able to make most repairs and adjustments to all machinery on the property. He also takes care of the tanks and sees that all departments of the system are in working order.

George Carpeneto, employed by the Borough Authority and Borough Council, conducts the regular daily tests of sewage and makes out the necessary reports for the State records. He studied that branch of plant operation at State College.

5 QUARRIES OPERATING AT JACKSONVILLE

Present Production of 10
Cars Daily Expected
to be Doubled

SEAM, 70 FEET WIDE, UNUSUALLY CLEAN

Modern Methods Used to
Speed Output; 40 Men
Now Employed

Development of the Whitetop Quarries' vast limestone holdings in the Jacksonville area, begun two years ago, is proceeding rapidly, and five quarries in one of the richest limestone veins in this area are now coming into quantity production.

The scope of the project is a trifle bewildering, with operations being rushed at various sites along the nearly perpendicular 70-foot wide seam of high-calcium lime.

The vein itself is quite different from the limestone veins in the immediate Bellefonte vicinity. Here the seams lie at an angle, which complicates open quarry operations, especially at Pleasant Gap where the seam is at an angle of only 20 degrees from the horizontal. At Jacksonville the vein is nearly at right angles with the horizontal, making the quarry sides rise almost vertically from the floor of the operation.

The vein has been lightly touched (Continued on page four)

Claim Damages In Boy's Death

Quici Family Serves Notice on
Council Alleging Boro Was
Negligent

At a regular meeting of the Bellefonte Borough Council, Monday night, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Quici, of North Spring street, served a notice upon the borough that they claim damages in the death of their son, Robert Quici, aged 8, who was killed June 23 when he fell into the Gamble Mill race and was drawn through the turbine.

The notice set forth that the boy's death "was entirely due to negligence on the part of the borough."

Robert Lenker, also 8 years, son of Emerson Lenker, who was playing with Quici near the mill at the time, also lost his life in the same manner. The boys apparently fell or jumped from a roof spanning the mill race, and were drawn under the water and into the turbine by suction. Their badly mangled bodies (Continued on page six)

FORMER STATE COLLEGE GIRL FOUND DEAD IN BOSTON

Workman Suspended
By Spike In His Leg

William Driebelbis, Jr., of near Shiloh, met with a painful and quite serious accident Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock while at work as a part-time hand at the project of the Penn State College dairy department at Kylesport.

He was working on a truck loaded with fence posts, when the posts rolled and a spike in one of them caught in his trouser leg and threw him. As he fell a sharp spike caught into the calf of his right leg and held him head downwards with all his weight on the hook.

Fellow workmen took him to a physician's office at Kylesport where the wound was dressed, and he then drove the truck from Kylesport to State College. He is now recovering at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Driebelbis, near Shiloh.

Following the discovery of the lifeless body of an attractive former State College girl in a room in a Boston, Mass., hotel early Friday morning, four men were held under bail totaling \$9,500.

Police reported that the victim was Miss Barbara H. Hanson, aged 21, daughter of Fred S. Hanson, of State College, a member of the staff of Penn State College.

Sergeant Joseph E. Fallon of the Boston homicide squad, said Miss Hanson, a Boston business school graduate lately employed as a book-keeper in that city, registered at a north end hotel under an assumed name last Thursday. Her older sister, Miss Hilda Hanson, with whom the victim lived in West Roxbury, was interviewed by police.

Miss Hanson's body, lying on a bed, was found by a hotel detective about 2 o'clock Friday morning after other guests had complained of noises emanating from her room. Four empty cocktail glasses on which police said they found fingerprints, and an opened bottle, were found on a bedside table. Also in (Continued on page four)
