Instead of dials and controls, the face of the machine contains a number of current outlets. The two wires leading to the welding tools are plugged into the various sockets to obtain different voltage and amperage combinations.

The interior of the machine is much like the interior of a transformer. A canyon of over 40 cans took the Scouts and leaders over to State College where they greatly enjoyed the Penn State-Bucknell game through the courtesy of Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics at the college.

A unit weighing several hundred pounds will perform the same welding tasks that expended a ton or more of expensive machinery under the old direct-current method of welding, the inventors claim.

Presidential approval has been given to a \$6,274 project for the reconstruction of the bridge across Spring Creek at Tangletown, Milesburg. The project is sponsored by Milesburg Borough Council.

The project calls for excavating; grading and draining roadway; constructing new pier; removing old bridge; surfacing, painting and performing appurtenant and incidental work. No taxes or assessments will be levied to cover the amount of Federal funds expended on this project.
