Lewisburg Train Kills 'Cyclist'

William Markle, of Millburg, Suffers Fractured Skull in Collision

William Markle, aged about 45 years, who lived alone near Forest Hill, Union county, was instantly killed last Thursday morning at 7:06 o'clock when the motorcycle on which he was riding to work struck the westbound Pennsylvania Railroad train at Millburg.

His skull was crushed when the motorcycle toppled over on him with considerable force, after striking the train. He was traveling north, and it is believed that he saw the train but thought he had time to cross. Marks on the road indicate that the motorcycle slid a considerable distance.

Members of the train crew were unaware of the accident, and did not learn of it until they had reached Coburn, Centre County. An attempt is being made to locate any relatives he may have had. Mr. Markle was on his way to the farm of Charles Kerstetter, north of Millburg, where he expected to husk corn, when the accident happened.

Woman Takes Her Own Life

Victim Suffered From Failing Eyesight and Poor Health

An elderly Houtzdale woman, whose eyesight was failing, last Thursday stood in front of a mirror at her home there to make sure her suicide attempt was successful as she plunged a butcher knife into her throat.

The suicide victim was Mrs. Jeanette Swiderski, 74, who had been in poor health for some time. She had stated for some time that she was "going away."

Dr. E. E. Erhard, Clearfield county coroner, said the woman had cut her throat so deeply that she had severed her whole windpipe. Dr. Erhard stated she had died of strangulation caused by the rush of blood down her throat.

A maid had been taking care of Mrs. Swiderski but had resigned her position the night before the suicide.

A FAMOUS NAVAL ENCOUNTER

How Small Ship Fashioned Like 'Cheese Box' Defeated Its More Formidable Adversary

Between the two ironclads, which occurred in Hampton Roads, March 9, 1862. His appearance upon the seat of battle with the Monitor, known as the "Yankee Cheese Box," saved what yet remained of the Union fleet from total destruction by the rebel Merrimac.

The Merrimac was formerly a United States ship, rated as a forty-gun frigate of 4000 tons burden. She was 231 feet long and 52 feet wide with 800 horsepower engines, and armed with twenty-four 9-inch shell guns, fourteen 8-inch, and two 100-pound pivot guns.

Clearfield Man Dies By Own Hand

Cleo Schenck, 59, is Found Dead in Yard Office of N. Y. Central

Using a shotgun Cleo H. Schenck, 59, of Clearfield, took his life there Monday morning in one of the yard offices of the New York Central Railroad where he had been employed.

Clearfield County Coroner E. E. Erhard of Curwensville, following a preliminary investigation of the suicide, stated Schenck had threatened to take his life for some time. No notice for the suicide was disclosed.

Schenck's lifeless body was found lying on the floor, a gunshot wound in his forehead. By F. B. Wilcox, track supervisor. The gun was lying near his side.

NEW EXECUTIONER FOR ROCKVIEW GETS 9 DAYS TO STUDY JOB

Warden Ashe Declines to Reveal Identity of Elliott's Successor, Who Was Chosen From Over 70 Applicants

The job you'd think nobody would want at Rockview Prison—killing men and women legally—has been filled, according to announcement by prison officials on Saturday that Pennsylvania's new executioner had been chosen—and then granted nine days in which to study the job in obscurity.

Warden Stanley P. Ashe, of Rockview prison, declined to reveal the identity of the man chosen to succeed the late Robert Elliott, but stated he had been picked from more than 70 applicants.

The new executioner is described as a "conscientious Pennsylvania electrician who feels he is doing his duty." It is said his name will not be made public until he sends three criminals to their death October 23. His "wages" will average \$150 per man.

Thus was Elliott's place filled in two of the States where he served. Another electrician was named New York executioner last Thursday. He is Joseph Francell, 42-year-old World War veteran, of Cairo, N. Y., who will throw the switch of the Sing Sing electric chair. Francell is well prepared for his job. On August 24, when Elliott was ailing, Francell substituted and pulled the switch on Arthur Perry, a Negro wife-killer.

Three Hurt In Rear-End Crash

A three-car, rear end collision Sunday afternoon, eight miles east of State College on route 62, injured Leo Johnson, Harrisburg; Lucille Rothrock, Lewistown, and Agnes Thompson, also of Lewistown.

According to state motor police of Pleasant Gap detail, the accident occurred when a car driven by G. A. Gimberling, Lewistown, slowed down for oncoming traffic, the two cars following immediately behind it, collided with each other, causing them to crash into the rear end of the Gimberling machine.
