Osceola Coal Operator Dies

Thomas Dugan, Sr., Was Pioneer Operator in Moshannon District

Thomas Dugan, Sr., 81, prominent pioneer coal operator of the Moshannon district, died Monday afternoon at his home in Osceola Mills. He had been bedfast the past three months.

Mr. Dugan was affiliated with the coal business in Central Pennsylvania his entire life. He worked his way up to a mine foremanship and then became an operator.

In the early days of coal mining in that section when the Moshannon Valley ruled the bituminous coal industry, Mr. Dugan and Patrick Gallagher of Osceola Mills purchased and operated the Powelton mine near Sandy Ridge. The Powelton operation was one of the first mines to be opened in that entire area.

He was also owner of the Leskie and Beaton mines and was a co-owner of the Moshannon No. 10 mine. He was instrumental in the development of the DuShan Mining Co., which is still in operation in the Osceola district.

Mr. Dugan was born in Leeds, England, and came to America when he was four years old.

Surviving him are the following children: John, James and Aloysius, all of Osceola Mills; Desmond, of Erie; the Rev. Father Gerald Dugan, of Erie; Thomas, of Patton; Miss May Dugan and Miss Agnes Dugan, both at home; Mrs. George Laws, of Osceola Mills, and Mrs. Walter Monahan, of Erie. Martin, of Osceola Mills, and John, of Clearfield, are surviving brothers.

Mr. Dugan's wife, the former Anne Jane Campbell, native of Philadelphia, died in 1926.

Funeral services will be held this Thursday morning at 10 o'clock from the Osceola Catholic church. The Rev. Father Wahan and the Rev. Father Gerald Dugan will officiate at the services.

New Directory to Be Distributed

Information About Bellefonte and Vicinity Given in New Telephone Directory

The new telephone directory which will be delivered here tomorrow, November 10, contains a brand new feature, Jesse H. Caum, manager for the Bell Telephone Company, announced yesterday. The innovation is a civic section, devoted to information about points of historical, educational and general interest in Bellefonte and vicinity.

The new civic section is located on the first four yellow pages of the book. It was compiled by the Bell Telephone Company with the cooperation of the Chamber of Commerce.

"As the county seat of Centre county and the home of six governors, Bellefonte has had an interesting history and contains innumerable places of interest. We are glad to help bring these facts to the attention of the public," said Mr. Caum. "The major points are listed in the new civic section, with a thumbnail sketch of each, giving the location and historical significance. Information as to the industries of the community and answers to questions about the municipality also are included."

Approximately 6,000 of the new directories will be distributed. This is an increase of 650 over the previous issue. The new book contains more than 4,500 alphabetical listings for this territory.

Firemen's School To Open November 16

The State has announced that a school for firemen of this district will be opened in Bellefonte on November 16, and to date both Bellefonte fire companies, the Milesburg company, and the Pleasant Gap company have signified their intention of attending the school.

George Carpeneto, of Bellefonte, former chief of the Undines and one of this area's most experienced firemen, has been named to conduct the school. All expenses resulting from the school are to be met by the first meeting of the firemen-students will be held in the Undine Hose House, East Bishop street, on Thursday, November 16, at which time arrangements for permanent quarters will be made.

According to reports, firemen will be instructed in, all branches of fire-fighting and fire-prevention, including ladder drills and similar practical instruction.

Yesterday Mr. Carpeneto reported that approximately 40 fire fighters from the three towns will participate in the series of 18 weekly sessions. Each school period will last three hours.

Among the topics to be included in the course of instruction are the following: Portable Entry and Minor Extinguishing Practices, Ladder Practice, Hose Practice, Local Water Supply Systems, Fire Stream Practice, Fire Fighting Apparatus Practice, Ventilating Practice, First Aid and Rescue Work, including use of respirators, life saving and first aid, Salvage Practice, Inspection, Investigation and Reporting of Fires, Fire Fighting Tactics, Administration of Fire Departments, and others.

The course will include written and oral examinations, blackboard talks, and practical instruction.

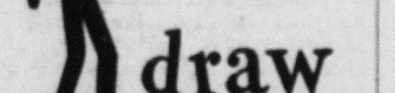
